OBITUARY

(Waterford Star) One of the oldest citizens of the village of Watford in the person of Mrs. Mary Widdis, widow of the late Robert Dougherty, died at the residence of her daughter, Mrs. Howden, on Tuesday morning, Jan. 30th, after a short illness.

Mary Widdis was born in Co. Cavan, Ireland, in the year 1826. Coming to Canada thirteen years later, for some time she resided in Newmarket, Ontario. In 1844 she was married to Robert Dougherty. Eight children, two boys and six girls were born to them. Of these, the two sons Robert and William, of Hagersville, and three daughters, Mrs. T. P. Graham of Hagersville, and Mrs. Howden and Mrs. Frank Somers of this place, survive. Her husband predeceased her thirty six years.

Much of her life since marriage was spent in the village of Jarvis where her sweet and gentle qualities won many friends and gave her splendid opportunities for service in the Anglican church which remained dear to her heart to the last.

Since the death of her husband she made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Howden. They removed from Jarvis twelve years ago, living for eight years in Watford. There she did her last active work when in 1917, interested in the work of the I.O.D.E. from June to September she knit 24 pairs of socks for the soldier boys.

Since coming to Watford, four years ago, the infirmities of age kept her closely at home. Those who knew her well will not soon forget her benignity and sweetness and deeply sympathize with those who mourn her passing.

The funeral service was held on Thursday afternoon. A short service was conducted at the home by the Rev. F. C. Rickard, assisted by the Rev. H. Wilkins. The usual burial service was held at St. Paul's church and cemetery, Jarvis. Ven. Archdeacon Irvine, rector of the parish, assisted by the Rev. J. H. Ross, of Cayuga, conducted this service. The impressive address given by Mr. Ross a former rector of the parish, and the large number present gave kindly evidence of dear remembrance of a loving mother now at rest.

DEATH OF JAMES R. VIVIAN

The sudden death of James R. Vivian, a life-long resident of Bosanquet occurred at the family residence, Forest, on Saturday morning February 3rd. Death was due to heart failure and his illness was short and decisive. He was around on Friday in his apparently good health doing his regular duties, and spent the evening in a social way at the home of one of his neighbors. He was in his hearty and jovial mood and expressed of himself that he never felt better. This expression was but a prelude for what followed later, for about three hours later the grim reaper had claimed him and he passed to the Great Beyond.

He was born on the farm on the Lake Shore now owned by Arthur Vancie, 72 years ago last July, just two years after his parents came to Canada from England. At that time Bosanquet was a wilderness and to his lot was given the task of assisting his father to make a home for the family. He was a good citizen and his motto practiced was the "golden rule." He took an active part in public and private matters and was always considered a man of good judgment, and his counsel was frequently sought by others.

He was married 36 years ago last June to Miss Lucretia Clemens, daughter of Mr. Jacob Clemens, who now resides in Forest and to them were born two sons, who now live on the homestead on the Lake Shore. Besides the two sons, Lorne and Stanley mentioned, he is also survived by his wife and two brothers and two sisters, John and Harry on the old Vivian homestead; Mrs. Emily Vance and Mrs. Annie McCallum of Forest. One brother and two sisters predeceased him some years ago.

The funeral which was held on Monday afternoon from his late residence was largely attended by his friends and neighbors and the many floral tributes testify to the esteem in which he was held. The services were conducted by Rev. George Hewitt, assisted by Rev. Jno. Murray. Interment was in Beechwood cemetery. The pall-bearers were old friends of the family, viz., Duncan Whyte, Caleb Travis, Caleb Rawlings, Edwin James, John D. Livingston and Richard Mackin.


