It is now plain that it was with a most deliberate purpose in view that Mr. Gladstone concentrated public attention upon Mr. Parnell. When he declared at Leeds that the agrarian condition had come to be a question of law on one side and of lawlessness on the other, and in the next breath vehemently denounced the Irish agitator for preaching a gospel of public plunder and massing public sentiment against the Land Act, he pointed with unerring finger to the responsible leader of the new revolt against land reform.

When the Land Act was passed, the great body of the tenants farmers, who disposed to accept it as an unqualified good. A large majority of the Irish members had voted for it as a substantial measure of justice, and the group of malcontents who sneaked out of the Commons when the final division was made formed an inconceivable minority. The first test election in Ulster resulted in an unequivocal victory for the Government.

Washington, Oct. 19.—Mr. R. T. Meritt, one of the most prominent lawyers at the National Capitol, has been killed by the assassin of President Garfield, and a programme has been laid out upon it. They propose to secure fully the question of jurisdiction before Judge Cox, taking the ground that inasmuch as the President died in a foreign State, his assassin cannot be tried in the city where the fatal shot was fired.
