The committee desire that every superintendent will see that his school is represented by himself and one other. Read this CALL to your open school, and at an early date elect your delegates. Elect such as will promise to come and who will bring back helpfulness to your school.

This is sent to all pastors of evangelical churches, to all superintendents whose address we have. For some counties we shall have to rely on an old list, not being able at present to get a revised list.

Superintendents, — Will you or your secretary please send in the names of those elected by your school to Mr. W. C. Whittaker, secretary of local committee. The St. John association have appointed an efficient local committee, who will arrange for all delegates or substitutes of delegates. But we must make it imperative that the names be sent at least one week before the 18th. We cannot ensure a home to those who neglect. Please note this and act promptly.

Will pastors bear in mind that they are members of this convention. We hope to see a large number present to meet the Rev. Dr. Hurlbut, whose labors have been a great blessing to pastors in many assemblies. Will pastors call attention to this convention from their pulpits, in their schools and at every opportunity, asking

special aid on its behalf, that a true Sunday school revival may result. Make your ordinary appointments bend that you may get to this convention. Forward your name to local committee so that a home may be provided for you during the convention.

With the October HELPER sufficient copies of programmes will be sent. Look out for it by Oct. 1st. Give one to each delegate. The October HELPER will also contain full instructions as to reduced fares on Railways, and all information necessary to those who are coming. The Convention Sessions will be open to everybody, and although the local committee cannot engage to find homes for more than delegates whose names are sent to them, yet we hope that many others will avail themselves of this opportunity of hearing Miss Harlow and Dr. Hulbert.

A SUNDAY SCHOOL ROOM.

As the Secretary left the Presbyterian Hall in Bathurst Village he was heard to express his delight in it for its purpose. Its tinted walls, adorned with more maps, charts, etc., than are found in many more places of protestant wealth, seated with chairs, furnished with good organ, — it might be worth while looking at it when you are building for school or for country church and school. You can add curtains or other partitions for your primary class.

A parish vice-president, recently reporting one county school in Restigouche, said, "This school, after opening, curtains each class off for its class work." O that some superintendents reading this would call to their aid some such plan helpful to the work. We have read that Hon. John Wanamaker, United States Postmaster General, does this in the great school of which he is superintendent. Perhaps some may like to follow so advanced a leader.
