HOUSEHOLD TTEMS.

The Hark.—Dandraff may be removed by the use of spirits of camphor, applied once or twice a week. It makes the hair glossy and the scaip healthy.

GINGER SNAPS.—Best together half a pound of butter and half a pound of sugar: mix them with half a pint of treache, half a tempful of ringer, and a pound and a half of flour. Bake in a slow oven.

Hoagseness.—Take the whites of two ergs and boat them; add two spoonful of white sugar; grate in a little nutnee, and then add a pint of lukewarm water. Stir well, and drink often. Repeat the preparation if necessary, and it will care the most obscinate case of hourseness in a short time.

**A Dish Fir ron a King."—Take a good-sized Porthgal onion and out a slice off the tag, shout a quarter of the way down; then from the larger portion remove the interior, leaving about three layer of the exterior part of the onion; fill this cap-like cavity with mutton (Australian if preferred) or any cold meat, a few bread crumbs, a little pepper and sait. Put the preparation in a baking tin, with a small quantity of gravy, and bake slowly for two hours.

COLD PUDDING.—Cut some sponge-cakes in three, and spread on them strawberry jam: well latter a plain tin mold or small dish, and line it with the cakes, taking care to put the brown part next the mold. Spread a layer of thick Oswego context, then noted. Sunstranks.—As a matter of timely suggestion we give the following directions for the treatment of sunstrack. It is from Dr. Hope's little work entitled "Till the Doctor Comes."

Sunstroke is a sudden prostration due to a long exposure to great heat. especially when one is much intigued or exhausted. It commonly happens from undne exposure to the sun's rays in reummer, but I have seen the same offects produced in a baker from the great heat of the bake room, It begins with grout pain in the head or dizziness; quickly followed by lows of consciousness and complete prostration. Sometimes, however, the attack is as sudden as a stroke of snoplexy.

The head is often burning hot, the face dark and swollen, the breathing labored and snoring, and the extremities cold. Take the patient at once to a cool and shady pince, but don't carry him far to a house or hospital. Lones the clothes theroughly about his neck and waist. Lay him down with the head a little raised. Apply wet cloths to the head, and mustard or turpentine to the calves of the legs and the safets of the feet. Give a little wank whiskey and water, if he can swallow. Meanwhile let some one go for the dector. You cannot safely do more than I have said without his advice.

FARM ITEMS.

CHERRY.—The plants in the seed-bed must not be allowed to get weedy. Brans.—Bush and pole varieties may still be planted early this month. Hoe those already up. BENTH.—Weed and thin; the young plants pulled at will make good greens, if cooked as spinach. Edg-Plants require plenty of heat, frequent hoeing, and occasionally a watering of liquid manure. Cucumures.—Plant in hills, 6 or 8 feet apart each way, and use plenty of seed, to allow for the bugs. CARROTS.—Keep the ground well cultivated beCons.—Sow once in two weeks for a succession : the late sorts are more prolice than the early kinds. Keep free from weeds, and break away suckers.

CABBAGES.—The early sorts will now be ready for the table or market, and the later kinds will be ready to transplant. Sow seed for late sorts, and as soon as large enough, transplant to ground from which early peas and potatoes have been taken.

MANGEL-WURZEL.—These may still be sown. Drill in rows. 2, to 3 feet apart. Four pounds of seed is required per nere. If the land is rich and the plants come up early, single out the plants in the rows. 3 inches apart. Later crops should be left thicker. say 12, 8, or 6 inches apart, necording to the time the plants have to grow.
