By Mr. Stanfield:—1. How many requests for the use of the privilege of using the word "Royal" has the Government considered within the past two years?

- 2. How many such requests have been approved and to whom were they granted?
  - 3. How many such requests have been refused?
  - 4. How many are still pending?
- 5. Has the Government of Canada or the Government of the United Kingdom refused to recommend to the Sovereign any such petitions?
- 6. Are there any conditions on the use of the word "Royal", and if so, what are they?

The Bill No. 393, An Act to readjust the Representation in the House of Commons, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, and ordered for a third reading at the next sitting of the House.

By leave, the House then reverted to "Motions" under "Routine Proceedings".

Mr. Langlois, Parliamentary Assistant to the Postmaster General, then presented,—Return to an Order of the House of June 25, 1952, for a copy of all correspondence, telegrams, reports, and surveys, from 1949 to date, relating to the opening of a central Post Office in the Village of Petit Rocher, in the County of Gloucester, New Brunswick.

At eleven o'clock, p.m., Mr. Speaker adjourned the House without question put, pursuant to Standing Order 7, until tomorrow, at eleven o'clock, a.m., pursuant to Special Order made Friday, June 13, 1952.
