**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** Shall I call it six o'clock?

**Some Hon. Members:** No.

**Mr. Deputy Speaker:** On debate, the Member for Eglinton—Lawrence (Mr. de Corneille).

**Mr. Roland de Corneille (Eglinton—Lawrence):** Mr. Speaker, I would like to speak to this Bill C-37. There is very little time left for me. In fact, there is only two minutes before the clock runs out. I am sorry that this is being put on the edge, but the Speaker will not call it six o'clock. May I call it six o'clock now, and I can begin next week or tomorrow?

**Some Hon. Members:** No.

**Mr. de Corneille:** I thank Government members very much for their co-operation. It is obvious that they are willing to cooperate in the new spirit of conviviality, cordiality, and co-operation. We have seen a lot of that. The Canadian people have noticed a great deal about the way in which this Government conducts its business, and they are becoming tired of it.

I wish to begin by saying that this Bill should be trashed, as should the Memorandum of Agreement which this Bill aims to implement.

The way in which we have dealt with the United States in the past has brought a relationship of a good neighbour policy where we have been able to respect one another; where the governments in the United States respected Canada and treated Canada in a way that showed that we were able to manage our affairs and live as good neighbours, because good fences make good neighbours.

The moment that this Government began to undertake its policy of trying to get in good with the Americans, trying to sell ourselves to them as special neighbours, we found that we were being repudiated and taken advantage of. Canadians believe that this Government is selling out this country. That is why at this time I rise to speak to this Bill.
