38. After the reading of Petitions, Senators introduce Bills. Advantage is often taken of a lull in the business to introduce Bills; but it is an understood Rule that they should only be introduced after the reading of Petitions. Rs. 61, 113; M. 380; B. 494.

39. The Speaker calls "Reports of Committees." All Reports are presented by the Chairmen of Committees, who also sign the same, and all marginal notes there may be. A Chairman having said he is ready to present his Report, the Speaker says: "Is it your pleasure, Honourable Senators, to receive the Report?" "Bring in the Report." After the Report has been received and read by the Clerk, the Chairman moves, either that the Report be now adopted, or that it be taken into consideration on a future day.
