itself dwell the last remnants of the Hurons. They have intermarried largely with their French neighbors, but the Indian features and habits still predominate.

There is a very pretty waterfall in the village, and less than a mile farther on is the reservoir, formed by the damming back of the St. Charles River, which provides Quebec with water. That is a delightful spot to partake of the lunch which you have doubtless



brought with you, and if you be of an adventurous turn of mind you may take a canoe and paddle all the way up to Lake St. Charles, one of those lovely sheets of inland water within easy driving distance of Quebec. Returning from Jeune Lorette you may pass through the village of Charlesbourg and will return to town with enough remaining energy for an evening stroll on the Terrace, to watch the lights spring out in Lower Town and in Levis over the way.

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
