The book is primarily intended as an introduction to the study of comparative religion, preparing the way for the succeeding courses of lectures in the series which as a whole will cover the subject of the Religions of the World.

The primary aim is to provide an introduction to the study of religion for the convenience of those expecting to enter the ministry and, more especially, those who have in view the foreign field.

To the investigation of the subject of the history of early forms of religion (on which Dr. Jevons is an authority) the methods and principles of anthropology have been applied.

The book has in consequence proved of deep interest to students of folklore, and to the wider circle of general readers. It accomplishes in compact form what no other work in the same field does, summarizing the results of the minute modern study of anthropology, estimating their bearing upon religious problems, and weaving the whole into an interesting connected history of the origins of religion.
