ST. LOUIS CASE AGAIN.

"I believe," says Mr. Beausoleil, "that Mr. Laurier has obtained all that was possible for any man to obtain from Manitoba. I believe and I hope that the Local Government, tired of a conflict that exhausts its strength and paralyzes the development of the province, is sincerely desirous of establishing peace once more in the province, and for this they should make another step in advance. A law of this kind cannot be administered equitably unless the Government gives the Catholics representation in the Council of Public Instruction, and in doing this they will show proof of their good faith and sympathy."
