Montreal stock Market.

Montreal, Nov. 11.—There were about 600 head of butchers' cattle, 20 calves and 400 sheep and lambs offered for sale at the East End Abattoir to-day. The butchers were present in large numbers and trade was good, but the prices of pretty good cattle were rather lower than on Monday, owing to the fact that a much larger proportion of this class of stock was on the market to-day. On the other hand, common and inferior beasts brought better prices than on Monday. There were no prime beeves on the market to-day. Pretty good animals sold at from 34c to a tritic over 34c per lb., common dry cows and rough young cattle sold at from 24c to 34c, and, the hard-looking bulls at from 15c to 2c per lb. Calves were scarce and pretty high-priced. A lot of four good calves were sold for \$48. The other calves sold at from 35 to \$11 each. Shippers are paying from 3c to 34c per lb. for good large sheep. Lambs bring from 4c to 44c per lb. Fat hogs sell at about 44c per lb.

Cheese Markets.

Kingston, Nov. 11.—There were boarded for sale at the meeting of the Frontenac cheese board this afternoon 1850 colored cheese and 235 white. Nearly all for sale was October cheese. Bidding started at 7½c for the board and ran up at a lively rate to 8c for selections and 7¾c for remainder. Mr. Vanluven offered 7½c for white, but no sales were made.




