In Dividing the Grant Made Montreal Harbor.

ple Against Wild-Cat Mining-Improvement in the Nova Scotia Fish Trade-Montreal News.

Montreal, May 29.—(Special.)—There were wild rumors yesterday of a frisis in the affairs of the Montreal Harbor Commissioners, and it was stated on all sides that Mr. R. Bickerdike and two others of the Government: representation on the Harbor Trust would resign because the Government contemplated giving a million for harbor improvements in the East end. Mr. Robert Mackay, the president, took in the situation, and, realizing that it would be jeopardizing the party if such a crisis were to take place, he convened the commissioners at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, when the whole matter was fully threshed out. Mayor Prefontaine and Mr. Bickerdike had it hot and heavy. His Worship championing the East end and the second named contending that more of the money should be spent in front of the city. The majority, however, came to a decision on the foliowing lines: There will be \$2,800.000 to spend, and of this sum \$750,000 will be devoted to a dry dock and wharves sufficient for extensive elevator accommodation at Hochelaga Bay. It is said that both the C.F.R. and the Canada Atlantic will build elevators here as soon as the required wharves are provided.

These men will not make their fortunes, but yet they will be able to sei out at a considerable profit. Among these Hochelaga landholders are Sir W. Van Horne, Sir J. A. Chapleau, Hon.
