A message to Gen. Miles from Capt. Allen, chief signal officer in Cuba, says the landing of troops is in progress. Santiago is to be attacked from both the rear and the side. This message indicates that cable connections have been secured close to Santiago.

Full reports from the chief surgeon of Admiral Sampson's fleet show that the bodies of the Americans killed at Guantanamo were not mutilated, but that the wounds were the result of Mauser rifle bullets. In the mining region of Catalonia, Spain, 17,000 people are out of work and more factories are expected to close shortly. There are fears of rioting, and the distress is serious.

Captain Aunon, Spanish Minister of Marine, having made an inspection of the Spanish vessels with a view to organizing a second reserve squadron, reports that the Lepanto, Princesa Asturias and the Cardinal Cisneros are the only ironclads Spain possesses outside of the navy, and it will take months to get these vessels into shape for service. The old ironclads Numancia and Vittoria have been repaired, but are found to be fit for coast guard duty only. Stores, guns and ammunition are needed and will have to be purchased abroad. The defences at Cadiz and Cartagena have been pronounced insufficient.

Even the most obstinate of the Spanish newspapers have at length renounced their "fight to the bitter end" policy and recognize the necessity for an early settlement of the war. The peace party is daily gaining strength, and the ablest financiers in the country are not afraid to have their arguments in favor of peace printed in the leading journals above their signature.

It is stated that anxiety over the war and the unfortunate situation of Spain has so preyed upon the Queen Regent that she has lost strength greatly.

Senor Cortina, the agent in the United States of Don Carlos, says the Spanish crown was offered to the pretender six weeks ago, but that he refused it, declining the responsibility which would be involved at this serious period.
