TO WIND UP A MINING CO.

National Trust Co. Appointed Interim Liquidators—Damage Suit for \$10,000.

Mr. Justice Lount yesterday granted an order to wind up the Trill Mining and Manufacturing Company of Ontario.

The petitioner was Joseph Wharton of Philadelphia. The company was incorporated in 1896 and began business in that year.

It carried on extensive works for over three years and erected a complete mining and smelting plant, but in the end it proved unprofitable.

A writ was issued yesterday against the C.P.R. on behalf of the widow of George L. Lumsden, a C.P.R. engineer, killed in a smash-up at St. Polycarp Junction, Que., last March.
