PUBLIC AGAINST MONOPOLY.

The defeat of the Ottawa Electric Company bill in the house of commons shows what can be accomplished by bringing a municipal situation clearly before the public. Public sentiment was the force that sent the Ottawa Electric Company's bill back to the private bills committee. With this force, the secret influence of the government could not cope. The government appears to have altogether underestimated the possibilities of an issue which brought the friends and the enemies of municipal rights into the limelight. That public sentiment influenced the house is clearly revealed by the fact that some of those members who voted with the Ottawa Electric Company in committee registered their votes on the third reading, when their position was placed on the public records. The World, which has done its utmost to make the municipal situation in Ottawa clear to the public, rejoices in a victory which emphasizes the force of enlightened public opinion, as against the influences of monopoly.



G.T. AFTER ELECTRIC LINE TO GET FRUIT BELT FREIGHT

Rumor Says Control of Hamilton and Grimsby Road Will Change July 1 -C.P.R. Desire it, Too.

umored that the Grand Trunk Railway will take over the Hamilton & Grimsby Electric Railway within the next month. The story is that the G. T. R. has secured options on a controlling interest of the electric line, which do not expire till July 1. The deal, if it goes thru, will be a good G. & B., who will get \$200 a share. The only thing that makes them feel sore is that the C. P. R. is now said to be willing to pay \$250 a share. The reason for this move on the part of the G. T. R. is to secure the freight from the rich fruit district thru which

the electric line runs. In the past the Dominion Express Company and the C. P. R. have got

company and the C. P. R. have got everything that was handled by the line. If Vice-President Hays does not secure the consent of the directors to the deal by the time the options expire, it is said that the C. P. K. will buy up the road. The capital stock of the H., G. & B. is \$300,000 and the bonded indebtedness \$150,000.

The farmers and fruit growers who live on the line of the electric railway are much exercised over the rumors, for it will put them at the mercy of the G. T. R., and will block the extension of the road to St. Catharines. Hamilton granted the road a bonus of \$25,000 under an agreement that the amount was to be returned with interest if the present company sold out. amount was to be returned with interest if the present company sold out.

The local officials of the G. T. R. and the officials and directors of the H., G. & B. all refuse to discuss the matter, but there is little doubt that the road will be taken over by the G. T. R. in the near future.
