

ROYAL ARCANUM RATES

GO UP BEGINNING JULY 1

Atlantic City, N.J., May 26,—It was decided by the Royal Arcanum to make a general raise in rates, based on the mortality table of the order, to take effect on July 1.

Even Congress Could Not Empower

Washington, May 26 .- President Roosevelt, as heretofore noted, has been u. ged

Attorney-General Moody has rendered no formal opinion as to the power of the government to make an investigation, but it is his opinion, expressed informally, that the president has no authority to order an investigation of that kind. It is doubtful, indeed, in the judgment of law officers of the government, whether congress itself, constitutionally, could empower government officials to make such an inquiry. The United States supreme court is on record in decisions against the conduct of an inquiry into the business of insurance companies, the business of the companies not involving inter-state commerce in any way.

Investigations may be instituted and carried on by the state governments in the states where the companies do business. Those inquiries may be made as rigid as is deemed necessary to develop the facts. Upon state investigations, therefore, government officials are of opinion that the people must rely for information as to the conduct of the insurance business.

Knights of the Road to Be Dealt

Deputy Attorney-General Cartwright has sent out this advice to magistrates

"It is once more necessary to call your attention to the law with regard to tramps and vagrants. Men of this class are believed to be responsible for a large number of burgiaries and other crimes of violence, and it has been found that the best results are obtained by imposing the full term of imprisonment in the Central Prison allowed by law. The practice of giving them the option of a fine or leaving the municipality has been found most unsatisfactory, and I am directed to say that when any men of this class are brought before you, you should administer the law strictly and vigorously; as in this way alone can serious orime be prevented. Instructions of this nature have been sent out previously, but have not been carried out as they should have been, and it is expected that attention will be paid to the directions herein contained. As the railway authorities are co-operating with this department, I have to ask you at all times to assist the railway constables who may be acting in this class of cases."

"While this particular work will apply only to the Borough of Richmond, there has been some very active business alone the same lines in New Jersey and Long Island.

"First of all, the public has not been sufficiently awakened to the importance of the subject, and the first effort of our campaign will be to educate it to the fact that the mosquito evil is as bad as any other that results in the spread of disease.

"Two or three prominent citizens will act as a committee with me and we shall try to have the head of every household look after his own premises for the purpose of getting rid of breeding places for mosquitoes, such as stagnant ponds, swampy ground and cesspools. We are only a part of a general movement that prevails in other cities to stamp out the mosquito evil."

At the health bureau it was pointed out that the co-operation of residents will be vital to the success of the plan for the reason that the law does not permit, the authorities to compel any person to fill a pond or swamp land, this being what the statute calls "an act of God." Where such a condition exists thru the volition of the owner, however, his land can be taken and the remedy effected by the authorities by the right of eminent domain. They Do Protest.
