evangelization The Presbyterian Church in Canada spends \$30,000 a year on mission work in the Province of Quebec. Last year there were in this work 28 pastors and ordained missionaries, 17 evangelists, colporteurs and students and 20 teachers, 37 mission fields and 93 mission stations occupied, with a Sabbath attendance of 2,415; 928 families under the care of the committee, with 1,079 church members and 990 pupils attending Sabbath schools and Bible classes. During the year 153 members were added to the church. Of the to tal amount contributed to the work the converts provided \$6,000.


