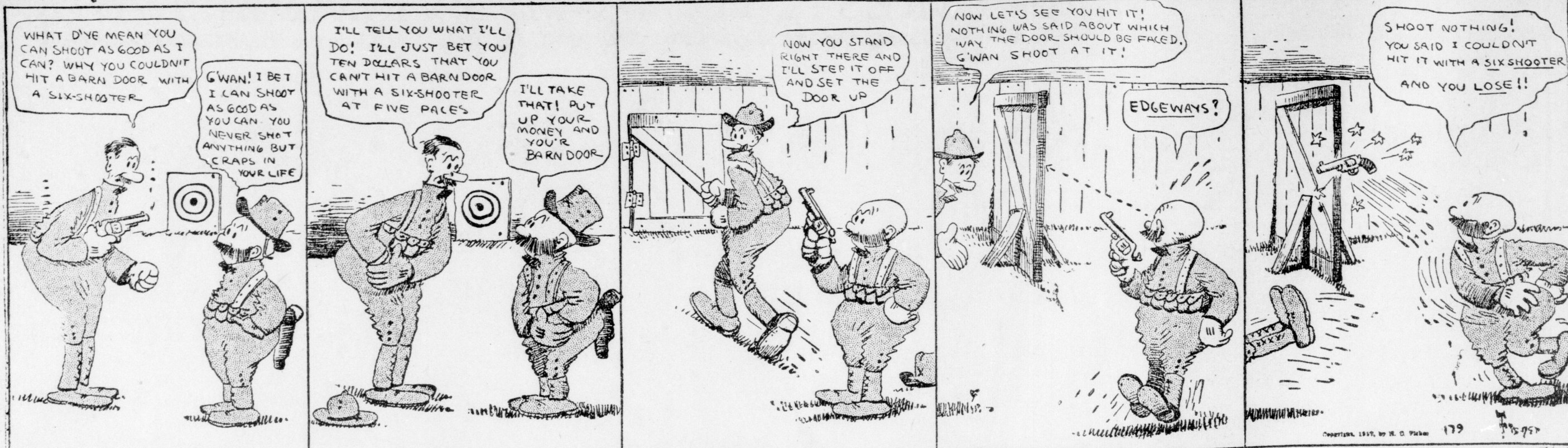

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FAMOUS CATCHER IS BURIED AT GUELPH

F. C. Snyder Played in London Before Debut as Big Leaguer.

GUELPH, April 23.—The remains of Frank Cooney Snyder, who died in Toronto on Saturday, were interred in the Union Cemetery here this afternoon beside those of his wife, who predeceased him several years ago. The news of his death was received with profound regret, as he was a general favorite here. He had been in poor health for several years.

Mr. Snyder was not a Guelph boy, but was born in Toronto about 16 years ago. He first came into prominence as a baseball player in this city back in 1895 and 1896, when he was a member of the old Maple Leafs, when such men as Bradford, Congalton, Cockman, McElroy, O'Connor and other well-known men were at their best.

Played for London.
He went from Guelph to London, and after playing part of a season there joined the Toronto team in the Eastern League. His work there was of such a high class that he was sold to Washington, which city was then in the big league. From there he went in 1899 to Reading, Pa., but he did not remain there long, as his throwing arm went wrong, and he was forced to quit the game, going back to Toronto, where he has lived ever since.

He was, when in his prime, one of the greatest catchers the game ever knew. He was not only a fine receiver, but also an excellent hitter, while his throwing was marvellous. He is credited with making the longest hit ever made at the Island grounds in Toronto.

JIM THORPE GOES TO REDS
