London aldermen are of the opinion that they should have some representation on these bodies which

they appoint.

TEACHER IN INDIAN SCHOOL GIVES INTERESTING LECTURE

Speaks To Audience in St. Andrew's Hall.

A very interesting illustrated lecture was given by Miss Margaret Russel of Bombay, India, last night at St. Andrew's Hall, exemplifying the ways and the ignorance of a large proportion of One of the most interesting things Miss Russel mentioned was the very changeable habits of the natives. She

stated that when she was teaching in the high school at Bombay, before the present king made his trip to India for the durbar, everyone talked sedi-tion. After he had gone, all one could hear was "The King smiled at me." One of the hardest things that the British Government had to do in the country was to keep the different tribes from coming to blows over their different religions, Miss Russel stated. The ignorance of the people in India was very pronounced, Miss Russel said. They worshiped five gods a day and went through numerous foolish antics. went through numerous foolish antics, which they thought would protect them from the evil spirit. A number of the natives, however, were taking advantage of the schools and going through for their matriculation. Some of them even came to America to finish their education.

The views which Miss Russel showed included a number of very pretty scenes in the vicinity of Bombay. One of them showed the fine school in which she taught, which is known as the Queen Mary High School, a name given at the time of the durbar in honor of the present queen.


