URGES INCLUSION OF BIBLE STUDY IN THE SCHOOL CURRICULUM

East Middlesex Sunday School Association Adopts a Resolution.

The Sunday School Association of the East Middlesex Deacons passed a resolution at its meeting held last night in St. James' Church for Bible study to be included in the school curriculum. This resolution will be read at the meeting of the Synod of Huron to be held in Brantford on May 10. Rev. Canon G. B. Sage said that this was one of the best movements yet made by the Anglicans, and that all that was needed to enforce Bible study in the schools was the united efforts of every Protestant denomination. Rev. Dean N. L. Tucker and P. D. Mitchell supported this, and that the movement had first been proposed at an entirely informal meeting, and the resolution was merely put before the attention of religious bodies. He said that he was sure that in the not far distant future the efforts of the committee which drew up the resolution will be recognized.

Rev. C. Q. Warner spoke on "The Sunday School Papers and Lessons Used and Given in the Anglican Sunday Schools." Instead of one syllabus being used for their diocese, each Sunday school was using a paper which it thought best suited to its pupils. He said that if the clergy patiently waited for the purpose of bringing to the attention of religious bodies, he said that he was sure that in the not far distant future the efforts of the committee which drew up the resolution will be recognized.

LOCAL GROCERS SAY CONTROL OF SUGAR WOULD DO NO GOOD

Declare Conditions Are Due To World-Wide Shortage of Sugar.

Local grocers are of the opinion that little difference would be made in the price of sugar or the supply of sugar if the Government did resume its control over the sugar situation. Such a step has been intimated by James Murdoch, of the board of commerce, and the belief of the majority of them is that the price is affected only by the supply and demand at the present time, and that the price could not be affected by any other influence. There was a shortage of sugar the world over, it was claimed by one large grocer. This was proven by the fact that although the price in Canada was unprecedentedly high, sugar was cheaper here than in any other country. Only a few weeks ago, it was carried in the papers that the United States had been forced to borrow several tons from this country. There was no great supply of sugar in the United States, it was claimed, and it was the dealers' belief that the shortage could not be relieved by the greatly increased demand that was sure to come during the approaching fruit season.

FRENCH CIRCLE IS FORMED IN LONDON

At a meeting held in the Western University last evening and attended by 80 people a "French Circle" was formed, with the object of extending and maintaining interest in French literature and history. The following officers were elected: President, Mrs. I. Somerville; first vice, Dr. L. P. Shanks; fourth vice, Lieut.-Col. W. J. Brown; secretary, Charles T. Reardon; treasurer, Miss E. McMechan. A vote was taken and it was decided to petition for affiliation with L'Alliance française, including violin selections by Miss Geraldine Regan, accompanied by her sister, songs by Miss Irene Parkinson, accompanied by Mrs. A. D. Jordan, and an illustrated lecture in French by Dr. L. P. Shanks, was much enjoyed.

STAGED MINSTREL SHOW

Referendum Resolution Gives Us Free Hand, Says T. D. McCullough.

VISITING ORGANISTS PROVIDE DELIGHTFUL FEAST OF MUSIC

Large Audience in St. Andrew's Church Is Enthralled—Guild Meeting.

It is not often that a London audience is treated to a feast of organ music as that provided at the recent St. Andrew's Church last evening, when the players were visiting members of the Canadian Guild of Organists, in the city attending a council meeting of that organization. There was Dr. Ernest MacMillan, the youthful organist of the Eaton Memorial Church, Toronto. There was Healy Willan of St. Paul's Cathedral, also of Toronto. There was Richard Tattersall of Old St. Andrew's, and H. E. J. Vernon of the same city, all distinguished musicians, and yet each a distinctly different source of delight to their numbers unfolded. Perhaps Dr. MacMillan came into closest touch with his audience, whether by the selection of the music or by a personal appeal it is difficult to tell. Certainly he was the first to receive a spontaneous recall. His playing could not have been called brilliant last evening, so quiet were the compositions which he chose to play. Yet so filled were their moments of song that they demanded a more sympathetic hearing than such numbers usually receive. They included Bach's "Toccata to God in the Highest," "Ah! Dear Lord Jesus" (Brahms), "Scherzo" from Symphony (No. 4), and "Claire de Lune" (Debussy).

Mr. Tattersall's final number, which closed the evening's program, "Finale," from Louis Vierne's First Symphony, was perhaps one of the finest of the evening. This vigorous number was played with brilliant and brilliant finish which demanded a recall from the audience, and announced Mr. Tattersall as an organist of the first order. Other numbers were Hillemeier's "Meditation in A" and "Improvisation," Caprice in E Minor (Joseph Joubert), and a delightful number played with keen understanding.

Mr. Willan opened the evening with a composition, a jubilant number, working up to a triumphal close. Here Mr. Willan demonstrated his genius both as an organist and composer. His other number was a group of three chorale preludes, "Sleepers Wake," "Voice is Calling" (Bach), "A Rose Breaks Into Bloom" (Brahms), and "Lord Jesus Christ, Thou art the Way" (Karg-Elert). The beautiful "Suite Gothique" from op. 25 (Boellmann), delightfully rendered by H. E. J. Vernon completed the program. This recital was arranged for by the London Organists' Club to follow the afternoon meeting in St. Andrew's Church of the Toronto Branch Council of the Canadian Guild of Organists. At this meeting was decided to hold an annual convention of the Canadian Guild of Organists in Toronto on Wednesday, September 1, at the Church House of St. James' Cathedral. Those present at the meeting included Dr. Albert J. Williams, Toronto, president; Charles E. Wheeler of this city, vice-president; Richard Tattersall, Healy Willan, Ernest MacMillan, H. E. J. Vernon, and H. E. J. Vernon of Toronto, and Fred Killmaster and F. L. Willoughby of London.

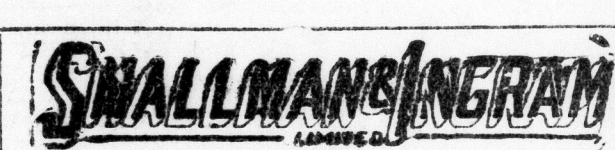

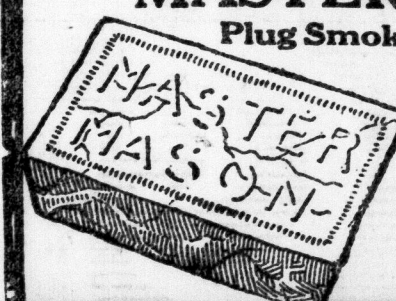
