Mr. MacGregor had just returned from the Hamilton and London Synod of the Presbyterian Church, and was also enthusiastic over the splendid total raised by this synod for the Forward Movement. The objective for the Hamilton and London Synod was \$775,000, and the result was \$1,058,000. The total amount raised by the Canadian Church to date is \$4,895,000.
