FUTURE OF ART SCHOOL
THREE COURSES OPEN

Ald. Gardner Says There Are Knockers—Committee to Report on Power Questions.

HAMILTON, April 13.—(Special)—Council this evening took the preliminary steps towards submitting the power question to the people, when the following committee was named to draw up the questions to be submitted to the ratepayers: Mayor McLaren and Aldermen J. J. Cooper, J. J. P. Doherty and Allen. The proposal to award a contract for a fifty-horsepower motor for the waterworks was laid over until the vote on the power question is taken. T. M. Wright and F. P. Dalby were reappointed to the cemetery board. Ald. Lees was given two months' leave of absence. A motion was passed thanking Andrew J. Carrion for his gift of \$75,000 for a library. The mayor was authorized to appoint a deputation to wait upon the minister of public works to ask for some improvements to the front of the city dock property. The grant of \$250 to the "Tigers" was opposed by Ald. Cooper and Milne. Ald. Morris objected to the raising of a number of bylaws, and voted against them all as a protest. The rules of order had to be suspended in order to give them their three readings.

The Hamilton Art School directors had a meeting this evening to consider the future of the institution. The city council has decided to give its \$3500 annual grant after this year. Rev. Dr. Lyle said there were three courses open—close the school, or to get the board of education or the government to take it over. He was empowered to make an appeal to the labor unions and the public for support, and there was some talk of submitting a bylaw asking the ratepayers to vote on what course they favored. Dr. Lyle said the cutting off of the civic grant meant the loss of the government grant. He had received a letter from the government stating that the government would give the technical college, in which every city showed the greatest interest, and if Hamilton cut off the grant to the art school it would lessen its chances of landing the big grant. He is dealing with the technical committee of the board of education will be arranged. Ald. Gardner was satisfied that some members of the board of education were knocking with the object of killing the institution.
