Earle, Fasken, Watson and Ferland, looking over the Nipissing property, where the recent fire caused such a scene of desolation, the object being to arthe desolation, the object being to arrange prices for the lots which will be eventually sold for new buildings. It was announced later that so far as the Nipissing land is concerned the prices charged will be as follows: From the southern and the prices charged to where Haileybury-road to where Tripp's livery stable recently stood, a charge of \$1.25 per foot per month; from that point on to where the cross street will be, opposite the site for the new freight shed, \$1 per foot per month; from that point to the end of the Nipissing property 75 cents per foot per month. On the three cross streets which it is proposed to lay out the prices will vary from \$3 to \$5 per foot per month, while what might be termed a number of back streets will have lots available at prices which have not yet been decided upon. It will be required that all lots are 25 feet by 75 feet. In regard to the Chambers-Ferland prices the matter has not vet en settled, but will probably be cided upon next week.

CHIEF ASKS FOR FIRE TUG ALDERMEN IMPRESSED

Improved Fire Alarm System Preposed-Lessons Taught by Island Conflagration.

That the city purchase a fire tug at an expenditure of from \$75,000 to \$125,000 was the recommendation made by Chief Thompson at yesterday's special meeting of the civic fire and light committee. The chief was instructed to make a written report, taking in also the question of enlarging the water mains on the island and other means of safeguarding property on the island. Chief Thompson and Chairman Ald. Church will ask the board of control to provide funds for a new building in which to instal a modern fire alarm and telegraph system. The board will also be asked to provide three additional firemen for the island and a scow to conyey fire engines to the island. Chief Thompson told the committee that the fire boat would be very effective and that the fire department was badly handicapped at the Hanlan's Point blaze as there was only a four-inch main going to Hanlan's and this connected with the ferry company's two-inch pipes. The company's men in being driven away from the hydrants neglected to shut off the valves, which tended to make the pressure weak. If it had been possible to throw four feet of water, Hanlan's Hotel could have been saved. He suggested that the city might station an engine at the island. Scarboro Beach was in the same position as Hanlan's, having its own water mains, but if a fire broke out it would sweep everything.

Tug Did Good Work.
Chief Thompson, privately disc Chief Thompson, privately discussing the Hanlan's Point fire, said a fire engine couldn't be taken over, as the ferry boats couldn't be utilized. The tug Nellie Bly did good work until moved around to the lagoon in an effort to save the Hotel Hanlan, when the suction pipe became choked with weeds. Waterworks Engineer Fellowes, speaking of the smallness of the mains at the island, said the department recommended a larger system for the island, but this was thrown out by the city council. He did not think it feasible to connect the high pressure system in the city with the island system.
