

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

MISS HOBSON REPORTED AS GRADUALLY SINKING

Was Victim of Auto Accident Some Time Ago - One Year For Black Hander.

HAMILTON, Aug. 9.—(Special)—The condition of Miss Dorothy Hobson, which took a turn for the worse yesterday, was unchanged to-night, and grave fears are entertained for her recovery. She is reported to be gradually sinking.

The police had only one prisoner in the cells to-night. He was a foreigner charged with common assault.

For slashing a comrade with a razor Ralph Rufus got a year in jail to-day. He is the Italian who figured prominently at the trial of the three Black Handers who got ten years each.

Hamilton is going to send a monster petition, backed up in the city by the board of trade and all shipping and business interests, to the Dominion Government, demanding that another channel be built at the beach for the accommodation of large boats.

The death occurred this morning of John, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Stein, foreigners, residing at 11 Arthur-street, under peculiar circumstances. The baby was put to bed last night at 10 o'clock, seemingly all right, and this morning was found dead.

EAGER TO BEAT RIVAL WARNE FELL TO DEATH

Young Englishman Cleaning Window in Darling Building Neglected Precautions.

Over-zealousness in a window-cleaning race with his partner resulted in a fatal drop of the steers for Harry Warnes yesterday afternoon. He was an Englishman, 19 years old, and had been in Canada three and a half years. He was cleaning an outside window on the fifth floor of the Andrew Darling building on Spadina-avenue, but had neglected, it is said, to secure himself with a rope, because he wanted to beat out his partner, Wallace Graham, who was similarly engaged on another window.

Warnes was leaning on the saah with one hand and the cleats gave way, allowing the saah to spring outwards. Warnes and Graham had recently formed a window-cleaning company and were working under contract with the Ontario Cleak Company. The body was badly smashed thru contact with the concrete pavement. It was taken to the morgue.

Coroner Singer opened an inquest last night and adjourned until the 15th. Deceased had no relatives on this side of the Atlantic.

Lacrosse Gossip Montreal Teams Talk About a Tie

The two Montreal lacrosse teams are talking already about playing off a tie at the end of the regular season. After all, one victory or one defeat does not indicate team strength or weakness, says The Gazette. The victory of Tecumsehs over the Hilaris invincible Nationals does not necessarily show that they are playing in championship form again. The Nationals, admitting that the best team won, said that Tecumsehs were only the better team for one day. Nationals had an off-day, they claim. The Toronto players took them by storm before they had recovered from the nervousness when playing before twelve thousand hostile "fans" on the field where their opponents were fifty per cent better than elsewhere, had worn off. The early Tecumsehs demoralized the Nationals, who are not famous for fighting uphill battles, and their improvement in the last quarter came too late to be of use. Montreal, after playing several thousand miles away from home, in lacrosse-crazy New Westminster, where every citizen has the men who try to carry off the town's big asset, the Minto Cup, are not likely to suffer from stage fright in Toronto.

Montreal at Tecumsehs and Capitals at Elmwood on Saturday night, the one here creating the greater interest. Nationals' defeat and Montreal's victory, so far as losses go, but Montreal has a far harder task ahead of them than the Capitals, there being two games with Tecumsehs, the Shamrock return game, and the Cornwall match in Montreal. The championship is Montreal's to lose, and the first of these, next Saturday at the stadium, is the hardest of the lot, and it is a toss-up if the "winged wheel" men can pull out a victory.

All the while we can figure that our own Indians or the Boys in Blue will finish somewhere among the also-rans.

There may be a triple bill at the island on Saturday. Eatons and Woodbridge of the Intermediate L.A. are billed to play the Montreal-Tecumsehs game, and if the Young Tecumsehs and Young Toronto manage to settle their Senior L.A. argument subsequent to the big fixture, a blissful afternoon is in prospect for lacrosse lovers.

Montreal has refused to accept western officials for the game. Manager Querie suggested the names of Waghorn, Kelly, Kearns and Baker, but they did not meet with the approval of President Findlay, who asked for further nominations. The chances are that Vice-President Marché will have to step into the breach again. The Tecumsehs had a rattling fine practice last night at the island, all the fencers being out.

Montreal Herald. Tecumsehs' showing against Nationals marks them as dangerous opponents in the closing stages of the race. Montreal cannot afford to lose a game if they expect to get that trip to England.

The Eaton and Norway Lacrosse Clubs will play their postponed game on Scarborough Beach grounds on Saturday night. Both teams are requested to be on hand, so the game can be started promptly at 6 o'clock.

On Saturday Woodbridge and Eatons play lacrosse at the stadium, Hanlan's Point, before the big N.L.L. game. This makes a double-header for Saturday. The game starts at 7 o'clock, and arouses much interest, as it is the district final between these two teams.

At Preston—in the C.L.A. juvenile series Preston defeated Guelph by 13 to 4. This was the cleanest and best contest played in Preston this season. Guelph played good lacrosse and never stopped trying, while the home team put up a strong defence game. Referee Bert Booth of Guelph was a good official. The captains were Brock Gordon for Guelph and H. H. Johnstone of Preston.
