Ottawa, Dec. 22.—There is a new and important development in the fight against the high cost of living. The de-partments of labor and justice have ar-ranged for co-operation in the working out of the recently-enacted regulations designed to reduce prices, and, at the in-stance of Hon. T. W. Crothers, the min-fister of labor, W. F. O'Connor, K.C., of Hailfax, has been appointed a commis-sioner to investigate into certain condi-tions which are assumed to have much to do with the prevailing high prices of necessaries of life. Mr.O'Connor.will immediately undertake to delve into the doings of the barons who control Canada's food supply and other necessaries, and he will proceed to any quarter within Canada where, in the opinion of the minister of labor, the cir-cumstances justify.
