

OVATION AT AYLMER FOR MACKENZIE KING

Speaks to Two Big Meetings—Says Delay in Election "Contempt of Public"

PLEAS FOR PROGRESSIVES

Aylmer, Ont., Nov. 18.—Delays on the railway beyond London delayed the arrival of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King more than an hour tonight, but the delay proved a "bitter-sweet" event, rather than an enhancement of his popularity.

Mr. King declared that because of the vacancy occasioned in the house of commons by Mr. Marshall's death, the elections of this constituency were being called upon today to select a new member for the Canadian house of commons.

SCORES ELECTION DELAY

Why, he asked, was this opportunity not granted at the beginning of this year, rather than near its close? Why was East Elgin without representation thru the whole of the last session of the federal parliament?

"Broadly, there are three questions, each of which the electors of East Elgin will have to decide for themselves before casting their ballots. The first is whether they intend to support the present government, automatic and unrepresentative as it is, or whether they will give their support to one or other of the progressive forces arrayed against it."

"A third reason why the present administration should receive no consideration of confidence from the electors of this riding, is that the remnant of the old Unionist administration, of which it is composed, appears to have retained all the bad habits, while they have lost the virtues of those of their colleagues who were members of the old Unionist administration."
