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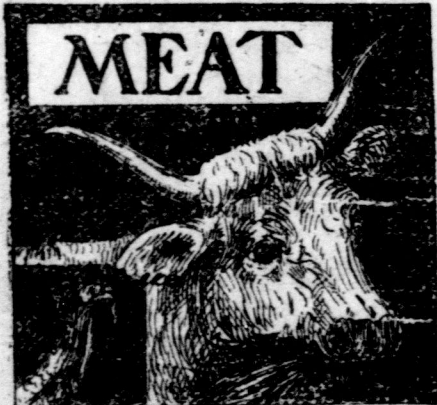
FOUNDING OF QUEBEC

Wife Desertion Prevalent in Ontario

The fact that family desertion is a prolific cause of the dependency of children, is forcibly stated by Mr. J. J. Kelso, in his fifteenth annual report, recently presented to the Ontario Legislature. Among other things the report said:

The desertion of wife and children by the responsible head of the family continues to be one of the most prolific causes of dependency. Public institutions in all parts of the country are overcrowded with this class, and in addition to the misery caused by these cruel desertions the burden of expense thrown unfairly upon the charitable public is simply appalling. No effort is made to bring these men back and compel them to do their duty, and even when they remain in town they are allowed an order of separation in the police court that frees them from responsibility.

Many children go astray because their mothers are widows or deserted wives compelled to go out working and thus leave the young people to their own device. The fact of emigration almost hourly in every of phase where the problems connected with neglected or dependent children are being studied.
