Mr. Speaker: Order, please. If the hon, member has a supplementary, will he please put it?

Mr. Holmes: I would like to ask the minister if she would give very serious consideration to referring the report of the Science Council of Canada to the appropriate committee or subcommittees, and give very serious consideration to their recommendation to establish a national advisory council on occupational and environmental health in order to correct this serious problem with regard to mercury poisoning.

Miss Bégin: Mr. Speaker, I believe that question should be directed to the minister responsible for the Science Council. I understood the question to be on the urgent need for research. I assured the hon. member that a major research project was going to be signed in a few days by myself and authorities of the Quebec government, McGill University and a representative of the Indian groups of Quebec. I can also say that further to the press release I issued on November 25, results of decisions made by my department for which I am responsible, and about which I am knowledgeable, are now being discussed with leaders of bands across the country.
