SOON TO CROSS OCEANNine From Toronto District and
Two From London Will be
Sent This FallCamp Borden, Sept. 15.—Nine of the
battalions from Military District No. 2,
the choice of which will depend solely
upon the efficiency of their training and
discipline, without regard for seniority
of number or strength, will go over-
seas, if the necessary arrangements can
be made before a move is made into
winter quarters. So said Major-General
W. A. Logie, who has just returned
from Ottawa. Two of the London dis-
trict battalions will also go."As the battalions will be selected
from those most advanced in training,
and preserving the best discipline," Gen-
eral Logie explained, "the slightest
breach of discipline on the part of off-
icers, N. C. O.'s or men will mean a black
mark against them. Therefore the bat-
talions will all be on tip-toe to take the
utmost advantage of the training and to
see that no individual member spoils
their chances by a breach of discipline."

ADVANCE ON TWO FRONTS

On the Somme front the French have
captured the Priez farm and enlarged
their positions close to Combes ac-
cording to the official statement issued
by the war office tonight.British troops in Macedonia have cap-
tured a salient in the Bulgarian lines
north of Mukovo. The British guns
were maintained against desperate coun-
ter-attacks.The Entente Powers are not satisfied
with the programme outlined by M.
Dimitroff, the new premier and the
latter has therefore abandoned all ef-
forts to form a cabinet.
