Wins Military Medal
Sergeant Major W. L. Gifford of this city has been awarded the military medal. The information has been received officially from London. Sergeant Gifford went overseas with the 26th Battalion, attached to the machine gun section, and a few months ago was reported seriously wounded.

In German Hospitals
Word has been received from Sergeant Major Roy T. Armstrong of the 6th C. M. R., who was recently taken prisoner of war in a badly wounded state, on June 2 at Ypres. He is now in a hospital in Saxony where he is slowly recovering.

New Aviation School
A recent cable says that Lieutenant-Colonel Hoare, an Imperial officer is leaving shortly for Canada to command the new Imperial aviation school, consisting of twenty reserve squadrons.

More Instructions
Lieutenant-Colonel Mercereau, G.S.O. of the 6th division, Halifax, who has been in the city on a tour of inspection, left last night for Halifax. It is understood that he intends to have more instructors attached to our local units.

The Trenches

The letter carriers have been instructed to hand in the names of all those who have refused the cards and also those who have not returned them after delivery has been made.

WORK OF THE S. C. A.

During the year of 1916 the Soldiers' Comforts Association sent overseas to the men in the trenches 23,881 pairs of socks and the great portion of these were hand knitted. The monthly meeting of the association was held yesterday afternoon in Centenary church parlors. Mrs. D. McLellan, vice-president of the association, presided.

The report of the corresponding secretary told of the receipt of letters from Miss Plummer, acknowledging the receipt of Christmas cases; also of acknowledgements from Lieutenant-Colonel A. E. G. McKenzie, D.S.O., of the 26th Battalion, for ten cases; Major McKinnian of the 36th Field Artillery, and from Captain Allan Leavitt, of the 3rd Canadian Divisional Signaling Company.

The McAdam Floated
The two masted schooner Emma McAdam, which was driven ashore on the bar at Spectacle Island last week while seeking shelter, has been pumped out and floated. The work was accomplished after about 40 tons of her cargo of coal had been lightered. Powerful steam pumps were put in operation and a tug towed the vessel to Story & Wardwell's wharf, East Boston. It is thought her bottom planking is stove in where she pounded on the rocks.

Bulgarian Drowned
On Saturday evening, a Bulgarian, Michael Georgioff, while working on the new Valley Railway bridge at Otnabog, slipped from the top of the trestlework and fell into the water. He was carried under the ice, a hundred feet down stream and was drowned. The body was found on Sunday morning. An inquest was considered unnecessary.

AN APPEAL FOR THE RUSSIAN REFUGEE FUND

In Poland more than 20,000 villages have been leveled to the ground. More than 2,000 towns have completely disappeared. On the road from Warsaw to Pinsk, a distance of 150 miles, the ground was simply littered with civilian garments and cradles; probably 400,000 human beings have died along this road. There was no time for burial. Beasts of prey had cleaned the bones dry of the marrow. So much for Poland. But Poland presents only one angle of the world's drama. Everywhere abroad, winter has set in and in addition to daily starvation, thousands will freeze to death, as thousands have frozen during the preceding years.

Think of the mothers and children crowded up in Serbian huts without proper clothing. Lend an ear to the bitter cry of the little ones as they ask: "MOTHER, WILL EVER THE TIME COME WHEN I CAN EAT AS MUCH AS I LIKE?"

Children below seven never reached Siberia and yet there must have been thousands of these babes when our people started for their march out of Lithuania and Poland.

These conditions make it imperative for us to appeal to the generosity of the people for help. The Russian Refugee Fund since inception of war has forwarded \$2,400 to Montreal. We are now going out to collect donations for that cause under the auspices of Mayor Hayes and trust that everyone will respond generously as they did last year. Collecting will begin next Monday by committee of ladies.

THE GIRLS' CLUB.

At the Girls' Club yesterday afternoon a large committee from the Playgrounds executive met, with Mrs. W. C. Good in the chair, and decided upon a reorganization of the work. It was decided to have one committee to direct the Girls' Club, and another the Travelers' Aid. The first named committee was formed, but the latter left open until after Saturday's conference at the Women's Council concerning this branch of the work.

Mrs. Burrington-Ham gave very helpful suggestions, and it is felt that as a result of yesterday's action the work of the Girls' Club will be made more effective.
