**PTE. J. J. DILLON**  
**OF 26TH BADLY**  
**WOUNDED IN THIGH**

Hit in the Fight on October 13 and Now in Hospital in Norwich, England

Peter Costello, overseer in the York Cotton mill, has received the following letter from private J. J. Dillon, of the 26th Battalion. The letter was from Takenham Military Hospital, Norwich, England, as follows:

"I take the pains to write these few lines hoping this finds you well, and the rest of the family. You will be surprised to see the above address, but the Germans got me last Wednesday, Oct. 13, their artillery managing to smash my left thigh. I am resting as easy as can be expected, but I have it pretty bad at night time.

"I was rushed out of the trenches to a hospital in Belgium (we were stationed on the Belgian frontier) then from there to a hospital in France; that was the place where I had it attended to properly. Anyway you only stay there to be dressed if you are a bad case, then you are shipped to England, and here I am.

"I had to be operated on in France to take a piece of shrapnel out of my thigh and they took an X-ray picture of my thigh, showing plainly the break. When I left there the doctor gave me the picture and the shrapnel as a souvenir. I came on a hospital boat from Calais to Dover then on the hospital train from Dover to here.

"We had just left England two days short of a month when I got it, but I was not the first. The same shell that hit me took the skull off another fellow, killing him, also damaging another fellow's jaw, and I also heard that Sergeant Cotter of our platoon got killed the same night.

"It was a Canadian hospital I was in in France. Doctor Margaret Parks from St. John gave me the ether when I was operated on and Major Forbes, from Montreal, was the surgeon. I tell you what, Peter, the nurses deserve all the praise they can get. They look after you great. Excuse the writing, it's pretty hard when you are laid up like I am. I guess I am right here for a year at least, so I would like you to send me some St. John papers to pass the time on.

"Well, I gave them quite a few rounds of ammunition before they got me, our trenches and their trenches were only seventy-five yards apart, all the time being done in the night time. Well, Peter, I am not feeling grand at present, so I will close this time. Give my best regards to all. Hoping to hear from you soon.

Brothers Meet Near Firing Line—Another Trench Call For St. John Volunteers

Mrs. Walter Howard of City road, yesterday received a letter from her son Walter telling of his having recently met his brother, George, in France near the firing line. "He is looking fine," Walter wrote, "and expects to go to London soon on a short leave. More of the fellows from St. John should come out here to help relieve the lads who night after night go into the trenches, not knowing what tomorrow will bring and whether this may be their last. Any man who is able to come should not hesitate too long.

"If they saw the damage done in the homes of the Belgians, I guess they would not be back much longer. It would make one's heart ache to watch them long. They have had a very hard time of it. The poor people here are very fond of the Canadians."

As mentioned in yesterday's Times, Mrs. Howard has two more sons wearing the khaki, John and Percy.

**ALEX. W. WHITEHEAD**  
**IS PRISONER OF WAR**

Color Sergeant in Princess Patricia and Formerly With Macaulay Bros. & Co. Here

There has come to C. H. Lee of the board of Nova Scotia staff here notification from the Department of Militia and Defence, Ottawa, that Color Sergeant Alexander W. Whitehead, formerly of St. John, is officially reported a prisoner of war in the hands of the Germans.

Color Sergeant Whitehead left here with the first contingent from St. John and was transferred to the Princess Patricia; he was an Englishman, but had been here for some time on the staff of Macaulay Bros. & Co. He resided in Paradise row.
