Raising of Full Amount Asked Will Likely Not Be Canadian Press
OTTAWA, Ont., June 2—Hon. J. A. Robb, Minister of Finance, is going to Parliament for authority to raise a Dominion loan not exceeding \$150,000,000. The purpose of the loan

is for "paying or redeeming or otherwise retiring the whole or any portion of loans or obligations of Canada, and for public works and general purposes." The Dominion government has \$35,-000,000 in two-year notes maturing on October first, and \$8,000,000 in twoyear notes maturing on November 15.

It was stated at the finance department to day that while authority is being sought for a loan of \$150,000,000, it is not expected that borrowing to this extent will be necessary.
