LOCAL NEWS

JURYMEN TO CHURCH.
Members of the jury in the Paris case attended service at Central Baptist church last evening.

DEATH OF CHILD.
Friends of David McInerney of St. Martins were sorry to learn of the death of his young son, George A., which occurred on last Friday, aged sixteen months. Burial was in Fernhill on Saturday.

OFF FOR THE WINTER.
The ferry steamer Governor Carden is off the route for the winter, so Commissioner Bullock said today. It was intended to replace her with the Ludlow early in December, but the accident to her driving gear yesterday caused her premature removal. Repairs will be made while she is laid up.

RAILWAY RATES.
The secretary of the board of trade has received Order No. 381 of the Canadian Board of Railway Commissioners, amending paragraph one of Order No. 350, dated November 24, 1921, which was published last week, to read: "That rates on cordwood, slabs, edgings, and mill refuse for fuel purposes be restored to the basis in effect prior to September 13, 1920."

CASE DISMISSED.
In admiralty this morning Chief Justice Hazen dismissed the case of Kouane vs. the Steamer Maplecourt on motion for judgment. His Honor finding that the claim was for a less amount than should have been brought in Admiralty. He allowed no costs. J. F. H. Teed, appeared for the plaintiff and Dr. F. R. Taylor, K. C., for the defendant.

NO PARKING ORDER.
On account of the difficulties which might be encountered in the moving of fire apparatus in case of fire, Commissioner Thornton said today that orders had been issued prohibiting the parking of automobiles in north and south Market streets. He said that parking places had been allotted on both sides of King Square, and in future the streets near the market must not be obstructed.

IN NEW YEAR'S EVE.
At a meeting of the Methodist ministers this morning in Centenary church the following were present: Rev. H. B. Clarke, chairman; Rev. E. E. Styles, secretary; Rev. R. G. Fulton, Rev. Neil MacLachlan and Rev. J. K. King. It was decided to hold a combined night service of the Methodist churches of the city on New Year's Eve. A programme for this will be drawn up at the next meeting.

THE WINTER PORT SEASON OPENED

Tunisian at Sand Point With 144 Passengers.

Stormy at Times on the Way from Glasgow—New Comers Fine Looking Assemblage—Two More Liners Due on Wednesday.

With the arrival of the C. P. O. S. liner Tunisian this morning from Glasgow the winter port season was opened and Sand Point again presented a scene of activity after many months of idleness. The large liner was due to arrive yesterday afternoon, but encountered a heavy snow storm which delayed her arrival until this morning. She arrived at 10 a.m. and was met by a large number of passengers. The liner was in excellent condition and the passengers were well looked after. The Tunisian is the first of a new class of liners to arrive at Sand Point. She is a fine looking vessel and her arrival has caused much interest among the local population. Two more liners are expected to arrive on Wednesday.

The passengers did not seem to mind the storm and lined the decks as the large liner emerged from the bank of fog and snow, and was slowly worked into No. 3 berth. The gang-plank was sent up at eleven o'clock, but none of the passengers disembarked until after they had lunch. They were all a fine looking lot of people and manifested considerable curiosity as they wandered their way through the freight sheds to the immigration building.

During the passage across nothing eventful happened, although one fireman, named Sibbald, whose home is in Kirkcubright, Scotland, took ill and had to be removed to the hospital after the steamer docked.

Aside from a quantity of "happy thought" (as one of the members of the crew termed it), or liquor, the only freight worthy of note were three goats and five banian poultry destined for Upper Canada.

Among the passengers were: Mr. and Mrs. D. MacLean, and masters D. J. D. and A. MacLean of Riverside, N. B.; Dr. J. E. C. Henderson of Zephyr, Ontario; Rev. J. A. Macdonald of Bala, Ontario; and F. B. Foster of Montreal.

The S. S. Tunisian is in charge of Commander C. W. Holder, who has as assistants, M. Murray, chief officer; P. H. Moore, first officer; H. Atherton, purser; J. Cassidy, chief engineer; T. Holmes Scott, surgeon; and H. Monkhouse, chief steward.

Two C. P. O. S. liners are due here Wednesday. The Caserta, which will inaugurate the service between this port and Italy, is due with twenty-two cabin and 160 third class passengers, in addition to 360 tons of general cargo and eight bags of mail.

The Sicilian is due from London with 1621 tons of general cargo, 307 from London, of which forty-five tons are billed here; and 1214 tons from Antwerp for various parts of Canada.

BRICK STRUCTURE TO REPLACE BURNED CITY HOSPITAL
Charlottetown, P. E. I., Nov. 28.—A new structure of brick will be built to replace the wooden building damaged extensively by fire last Tuesday, in which has housed the Charlottetown city hospital since 1879. This was decided at a meeting of St. Dunstan's Catholic congregation last night.

INCREASE COST OF STREET LIGHTING

Letter from Power Company at Council Meeting.

Sum of \$18,000 Received for Snow Removal—Transfer of Fire Apparatus—Other Matters Taken Up.

A further increase in the cost of street lighting in the city was forecasted in a letter from the New Brunswick Power Co. read at a meeting of the city commissioners this morning. The company also expressed the intention of replacing broken lamps only four times in a calendar year, and replacements more than that number to be charged to the city. Commissioner Frink announced the receipt of \$18,000 for snow removal from the power company. The mayor presided and all the commissioners were present.

Commissioner Thornton read a letter from the N. B. Power Co., regarding street lighting, stating that they would supply four light replacement a year free of charge but any replacement after that would be charged to the city.

The company also asked that they had decided not to make abatement for charges for lights out. It was stated that the company maintained a system of inspection and policemen should notify the company of lights reported out and replacements would be made.

In reply to a letter from the commissioner, the company wrote that the new regulations should go into effect on Dec. 1.

The company said that they would discuss with the commissioner the matter of rates for 1922, but it was anticipated that there would be an increase. They also thought that lighting charges should not be subject to a 4 per cent. discount, as it was not felt that the company should pay taxes on the service to the city.

Commissioner Thornton said that no written agreement was made with the company regarding lighting rates. He thought that the company did not display a spirit of co-operation in giving such short notice of impending changes. According to a verbal agreement, the commissioner said, the company was to be allowed a reduction for lights being out. He said the additional replacements were no doubt due to some extent at present to breakage from rowdiness. He said he would notify the company that the present agreement should not be changed this year, and would report back to the council.

Overcoat Headquarters
The mayor reported that Mr. Mountain engineer for the railway commission, was in the city last week and looked over the site of the proposed overhead crossing in Douglas avenue.

He said he had word from the power company regarding their refusal to contribute a portion of the cost of the crossing.

The mayor said he would report on Thursday regarding the letter received from the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission.

Commissioner Frink reported that the work on the Marsh road had been shut down. There was still a short piece near the One Mile House uncompleted.

Commissioner Thornton reported plans to remove the horse-drawn chemical from No. 1 station to No. 6 on the west side. He thought this should induce the fire underwriters to reduce the insurance rates in West St. John.

Money for Snow Removal.
Commissioner Frink said that he had received \$18,000 from the power company for snow removal and he would be able to carry on the work with some of the unemployed. He said the men engaged were being paid \$3.50 a day, except the watchmen who received \$3.00.

He thought that, for emergency work, the rate for temporary help should be less. If the \$3.50 rate had to be adhered to, he thought that the work should be divided up. He said that snow shovellers from his office or the menial workshops charged forty cents an hour, but he had sent some men out on emergency work at \$2.50 a day.

The mayor said he hoped to get cleared up tomorrow the matter of claims of returned men for half pay during the time they were overseas.

MAGISTRATE DID NOT LIKE IT
Matter of Prisoners Released on Deposit Causes Remarks in Court.

In the police court this morning one man, charged with drunkenness, pleaded guilty and was remanded.

Two others were arrested over the week-end on like charges. On the magistrate calling for them this morning it was discovered that they had been let out on deposits and had not shown up.
