RING.

Cook Knocked Out by Carpenter in Fourth Round.

London, Jan. 12.—Georges Carpenter knocked out George Cook, of Australia, in the fourth round of the bout here tonight.

A straight left to the chin and a right to the jaw felled Cook for the count. He was up on one knee when the referee, Jack Smith, finished the count of ten, but was too late.

The weights were announced as Cook, 169 pounds, and Carpenter, 170 pounds. In the opening round, Carpenter was the first to lead, scoring with both his left and right without a return. Cook tried for a right swing, but missed. Considerable in-fighting followed in which neither man had any marked advantages. Cook took a nasty blow on the ribs, but himself scored well toward the close of the round.

Both men sparred cautiously at the beginning of the second round. Carpenter landed a left hook to the jaw and easily craved an attempt at a counter. The Australian had the better of the in-fighting which ensued and twice sent home hard lefts which surprised Carpenter, who continually failed to find openings for his right.

The Frenchman's Round.
Up to the third round the bout appeared to be going in favor of the Australian. In the third round Carpenter landed a light left to the chin, but at close quarters Cook fought hard. Carpenter's best work seemed to be at long range. Near the end of the round the Frenchman scored well with lefts and rights to the head and body, and it was easily his round. The Australian caught Carpenter with a blow to the jaw after the bell had sounded and was cautioned by the referee.

Early in the fourth round the fighting was mostly at close quarters. Carpenter twice landed lefts on the head and Cook scored to the chin. The Australian then rushed Carpenter, but only to meet with a straight left to the jaw and two rights to the same place, which ended the bout.

There was considerable betting prior to the fight with Carpenter the favorite at 5 to 2.

St. Paul Gets Gonzales.

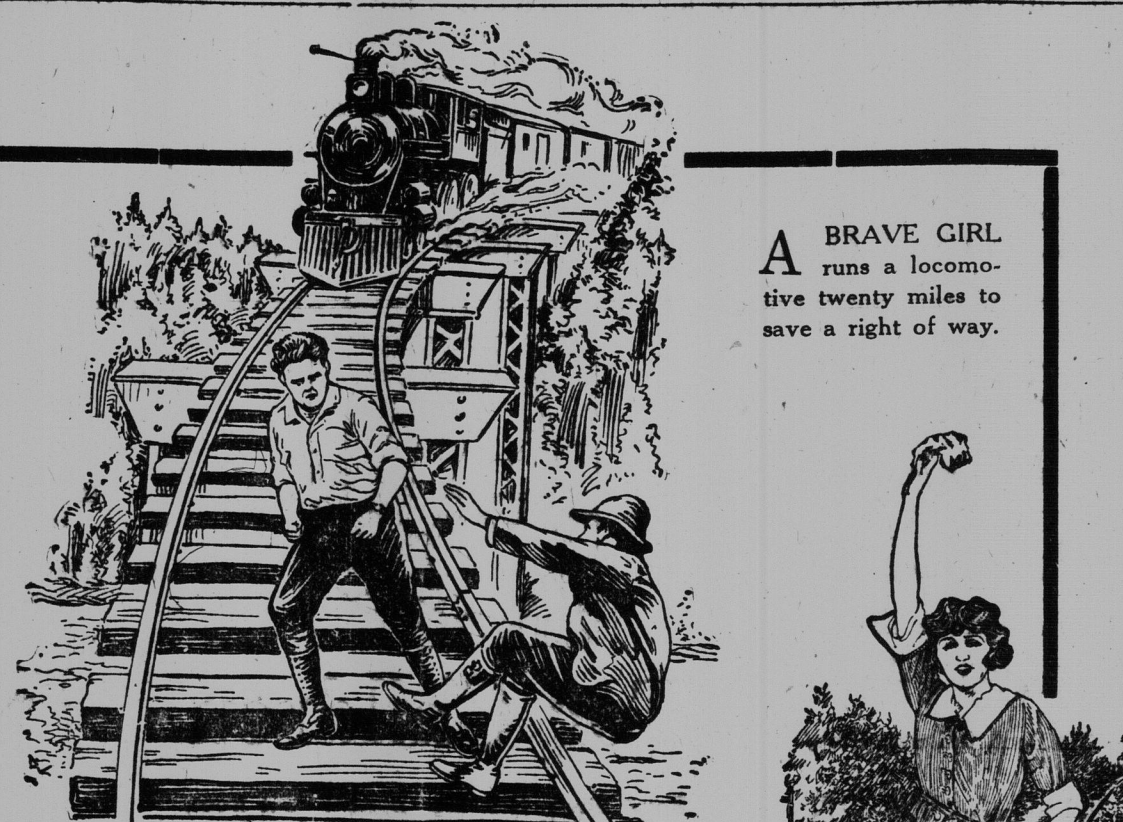

Canadian Jockey.

That C. Lang, a Canadian youth of 17, who has had only 18 months' experience with horses, should lead the jockeys of the country in the number of winning mounts in 1921, indicates emphatically the possibilities for achieving success in the saddle quickly under present racing conditions, with its plenitude of contests at low weights.

Since the period when James Shields developed Henry J. Griffin the turf furnishes no parallel to the career of the Hamilton, Ont., lad, who is now riding three winners steadily at New Orleans.

Griffin was only 15 when he created a sensation by riding so many winners at a conference between Jack Butcher and the jockey, who was long past 80, and had brought to the building turf a knowledge that was rich and varied through his associations with the trotters, was running Woodruff or some of the other iron horses in his string.

It was said of Lang, the newest sensation in the way of a jockey, that he is a natural to learn and possesses good habits. While these are requisites for success, there must also be a natural aptitude for that would fall under this head is the sympathetic appeal which some jockeys possess. Griffin seemed to get acquainted at once with every horse he rode and they gave him their best always. Griffin rarely struck a horse, confining his efforts to hands and heel in a tight finish, and a powerful adversary he was in the last 100 feet of a hard race.

James Arthur, to whom Lang is apprenticed, has brought out some fairly good riders in the 25 years he has been racing horses. The turf never needed riders so badly as at present. Most of the jockeys of today have no knowledge of pace, and when it comes to "hands," those who have this qualification are few and far between.

Buff Declines Three Offers.

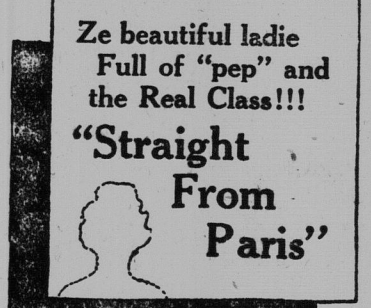
Johnny Buff, world's bantamweight champion and American flyweight titleholder, who visited Madison Square Garden to bid farewell to the champion's admirers there. During his visit Diamond received three offers for bouts, but declined them all. Harry Neary advanced an offer of \$25,000 for a bout between the champion and Midget Smith; Eddie Mead wanted a meeting between Buff and Joe Lynch without demanding any remuneration for the latter, thus giving Buff all the percentage permitted under the rules of the State Athletic Commission; and Lee P. Flynn submitted an offer of \$35,000 or thirty-five per cent. of the gross receipts at a garden for a battle between Buff and Harold Farsee, Harrison boxer. In declining these offers, Buff said that he was not interested in money, but in the sport.

**WEST BECKER
WINS MILE EVENT**

Is One of the Star Skaters Entered in the Canadian Championships at St. John.

West Becker of the Tremont Skating Club won the Class A one-mile scratch race, the feature of the weekly carnival at the 181st Street Ice Palace last night. Twelve starters took part and skated in a compact group until the third lap from

the finish. Here, Jimmy Smith of the 181st Street Ice Palace team started a sprint which brought him a lead of five yards by the time the next to the final lap was reached. He maintained his advantage through this lap and looked to be a sure winner when, half through the final lap, he caught his skis on the side of the rink and fell heavily.

Becker was leading the remainder of the field, and when Smith fell he went into the lead, winning by three yards, with Sam Goldberg and William Murphy third. The time was 2:33.2-5.

Stanley Ryan, unattached, won the Class B one-mile handicap race, followed in order by Fred Engels and Carl Schroer. Ryan had a handicap of thirty yards. Fred Adler captured the quarter-mile novice event.

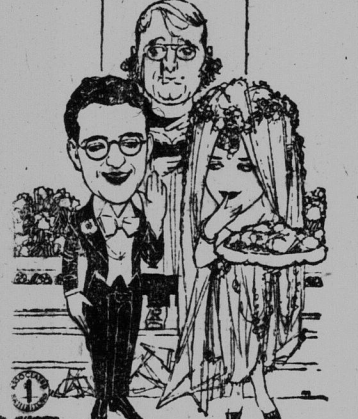
