The secretary of the Board of Trade is in receipt of an inquiry from Cincinnati, Ohio, for information about St. John and the province of New Brunswick.

TRAFFIC CASES.

Daniel McCafferty in court today said he didn't remember whether or not he was guilty of exceeding the speed limit at the corner of Queen and Prince William street on Friday. Policeman Lewis said that he had turned the corner at between 12 and 13 miles an hour. A fine of \$10 was struck.

Samuel Seely gave a similar answer to a charge of speeding along Charlotte street on the same day. Policeman Orr testified that he had seen the defendant drive past the head of King street at 18 or 20 miles an hour. The accused was fined \$10.

NEAR END OF THE WINTER SEASON

Several Steamships to Get
Away from Here Tomorrow—Activity of Schooners.

With the sailing of several steamers tomorrow and Friday the winter port season, so far as some of the lines are concerned, will be finished. The C. F. S. freighter Batsford will get away early tomorrow morning for London and Rotterdam and will be the last C. F. S. freighter this season. The Empress of Britain, due at five o'clock this afternoon is the last passenger boat this season. The Head Line steamer Carriagan Head will get away on Friday and will clean up the season for MacLean Kennedy Limited, with the exception of the steamer Clan Buchanan, which is due in port to load for South America on April 24. She is coming here in place of the Houston liner Hyanthos, whose trip was cancelled. The Canada Steamships Limited, will get their last steamer, the Brant County away tomorrow.

The C. G. M. M. season is not quite over. The last incoming vessel, the Canadian Mariner, from Swansea, reported this morning that she would arrive in port about nine o'clock this evening. When she arrives this line will have five in port. The first to get away on her last trip of the season will be the Canadian Aviator, which will sail for Cardiff and Swansea tomorrow night, and she will be followed by the Canadian Conqueror on Saturday, for Liverpool.

The remaining three will get away a short time after. This will clean up the winter port work, as the Donaldson, Furness, New Zealand and South African companies have already dispatched their last sailings for the season.

The Schooners.

Much activity is evidenced around the water front in the schooner movements. Much of this is due to lumber and lath shipments to the United States. Nagle & Wigmore reported this morning that they have five large schooners ready to sail with favorable weather, each laden deeply with lumber or laths, as follows: Schooner Seaman A. O. for Providence, with lumber schooner Emily F. Northam, with lumber for New York; schooner Harry A. McLellan, with lumber for New York; schooner Wavenock with laths for Philadelphia; schooner Harriet B. with laths and lumber for New York. In addition to these the schooner Peter McIntyre is also ready to sail with lumber for an American port. Other schooner movements in connection with lumber shipments are reported as follows:

The schooner Neva arrived here yesterday in ballast from Bear River to load lumber for Boston.

The schooner Karmoe is loading lumber for Boston.

The schooner Holmes A. Frank is loading lumber for New York.

The schooner Edward Smith has been chartered to load lumber at St. Martin's for New York.

The schooner Northern Light is due here from St. Martin's to load lumber for New York.

Other schooners here are the Northcliffe, which is discharging salt at the Eastern Steamships Company's wharf, and the schooner Maid of Scotland, which is discharging a cargo of fertilizer at Dunn's slip, after which she will go to Liverpool to load pulp for the United States.

WIDOW OF HON. JOHN COSTIGAN DEAD

Ottawa, April 19.—The death of Mrs. John Costigan, widow of Hon. John Costigan, Liberal member for Victoria and Madawaska, from confederation until his death six years ago occurred here yesterday at the age of 90 years. Interment will be made at Grand Falls, N. B. Her son, Harry Costigan of Quebec, and two daughters, Mrs. Walter Armstrong and Mrs. D. C. F. Bliss, both of Ottawa, survive.

LICENSED TO CARRY EMIGRANTS TO U.S. AND CANADA FROM HUNGARY

London, April 19.—(Canadian Press)—A Reuter despatch from Budapest says the Hungarian government has granted a license to the Hamburg America Steamship Line to carry emigrants to the U. S. and Canada.

MEN WERE HOSTS, LADIES GUESTS

The East End Improvement League Has Banquet and Social—The Community Spirit.

The East End Improvement League never does things by halves. What may be described as its first annual supper and dance took place last evening in Thorne Lodge Hall. It was also a tribute by the men to the ladies of the league, whose work in connection with the canteen and in other ways added greatly to funds and kept the men up to their work for the benefit of the young people who use the playgrounds and skating rink.

The men were the caterers and the ladies were the guests, and the tables were laden with all the requirements for a real banquet. Nearly forty persons were present and the waiters were most assiduous. Merriment prevailed and the spirit of real comradeship. Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Belding were invited guests, the former having called the meeting at which this League was originally organized, and an invitation was also extended to K. G. MacCrae, through whose kindness the grounds had been secured, but he was unable to attend.

After the banquet had been served President David Ramsay proposed the toast to the King, and then Our Guests, to which Mr. Belding responded, congratulating the League on doing the finest community work ever done by one organization in St. John for the benefit of the boys and girls of its neighborhood. The tables were quickly put away, and the four sections of the city would each have one, with playground, skating rink and boys' club; and urged the east end to continue to set the example of splendid team work. This League is especially to be congratulated on having so faithful a group of women to inspire and aid the men.

F. L. Barrett responded to the toast to the League and especially the Ladies. Mr. Barrett agreed that the community spirit was in evidence, but not to the extent desirable. If it were widespread and as vigorous as it should be the people of that section would go to City Hall and demand the improvement of the street in front of the hall, and other improvements to which as taxpayers they were entitled. He could not say enough in praise of the ladies, for the value of their work could not be estimated. The tables were quickly put away, and with violin and piano to provide music the whole party, most of the members married folk, enjoyed an hour of dancing. There were also songs and choruses by the whole party and a delightful social reunion. At the close Auld Lang Syne, O Canada and the National Anthem were sung.

The League is now awaiting the action of the baseball leagues. Its ground is already dry enough for practice games.

TOOK HIM BACK TO BOYHOOD DAYS

David Doig Saw Scenes of Years Ago in "The Little Minister" Picture.

NATIONAL HOSPITAL DAY, MAY 12TH

Having accepted the chairmanship for National Hospital Day, May 12, I will co-operate with the National Hospital Day Committee, Chicago, in the second annual observance of National Hospital Day in the Province of New Brunswick. The National Hospital Day movement is for the purpose of acquainting the people of the country with hospitals and hospital service, and it has been highly endorsed by Hon. William Pugsley, lieutenant-governor of New Brunswick, and many other leaders in public life.

We hope that all the hospitals of New Brunswick will co-operate with the thousands of other institutions throughout North America in a uniform programme on May 12.

In most cases the hospitals will hold "Open House" and arrange exhibitions to give the people some idea of how really important is the service rendered by the hospitals. It is expected that 4,000 hospitals will arrange a programme for National Hospital Day, and that one million people will visit their local hospitals then.

Hospitals are necessities in the community, and, as all other necessities, must be well known to the public, and the public must support them morally and financially.

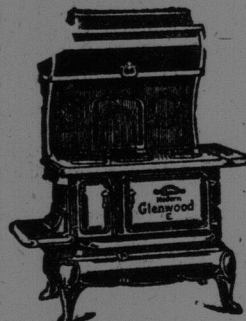

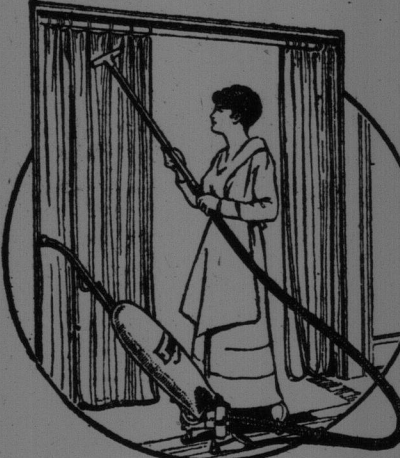
