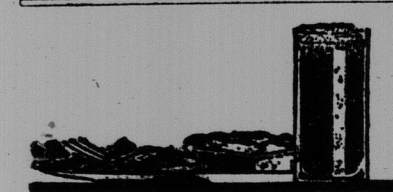

MADE A DEEP IMPRESSION

Address of Sir J. Martin Harvey to Canadian Club One of Great Patriotism.

Yesterday's meeting of the Canadian Club at luncheon was one of more than usual interest made so by the presence of Sir John Martin Harvey. He raised his audience to a fever pitch of patriotism by his impassioned rendering of the "Chant of Love for England" written by an American in 1915 in reply to the German Hymn of Hate. President Horner Porter was in the chair and introduced the speaker who began with some humorous stories and then recited a composition written by his manager, Frank B. O'Sullivan, entitled "Trans-Canada, a Lightning Impression" dealing with the different cities visited in a tour across Canada.

In referring to the war, he spoke of the various attempts to break the British Empire, that of Philip of Spain, that under Louis XIV, that by Napoleon, and finally the German stroke. After each attempt, successfully resisted, the empire always expanded. Today the British Empire is stronger and more unified than ever in its history, a statement which, like many others, brought warm applause. Then he came to Britain's appreciation of the aid given by the overseas dominions, and referred to a conversation he had with Lloyd George just before leaving England in which the British prime minister spoke at length of the great work of the Canadian army, referring, in reply to a question by Sir John, to four outstanding achievements by the Canadians; the second battle of Ypres, the taking of Vimy Ridge, the breaking of the Hindenburg line, and the great stroke before Amiens which, as Ludendorff had confessed, brought final defeat to the Germans. Sir John dwelt upon Britain's gratitude to Canada, referred to the German Hymn of Hate and then declaimed the answer to it, Helen Gray Cone's verses, published in the Atlantic Monthly in 1915, entitled "An American Chant of Love for England."

A song of hate is a song of Hell;
Some there be that sing it well.
Let them sing it loud and long.
We lift our hearts in a letter song:
We lift our hearts to Heaven above,
Singing the glory of her we love—
England!

Glory of thought and glory of deed,
Glory of Hampden and Runnymede,
Glory of ships that sought far goals,
Glory of words, and glory of souls,
Glory of songs mounting as birds,
Glory immortal of magical words,
Glory of Milton, glory of Nelson,
Tragic glory of Gordon and Scott;
Glory of Shelley, glory of Sidney,
Glory transcendent that perishes not.
Here is the story, here be the glory,
England!

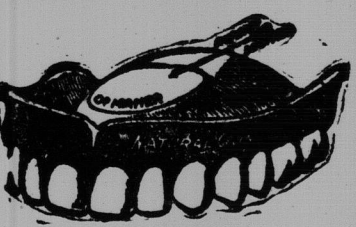

POSTAL EMPLOYEES SHOOT TO KILL

These Orders, With 20,000 Automatics, Go Out to U. S. Employees—Get \$5,000 Reward.

Washington, May 18.—"Shoot to kill!" These are the orders which, with 20,000 automatic pistols and thousands of riot shotguns, have gone out to postal employees throughout the United States by order of Postmaster-General Hayes.

"We simply have to go back to the old Wells-Fargo ways and put an end to mail robberies by the drastic methods then in vogue," the postmaster-general asserted. Referring to the fact that in the past few months, four mail employees have been murdered and thirty-three major robberies have taken place with a known loss of \$6,000,000, Mr. Hayes declared that half-way measures will not cope with the situation.

But while postal employees by the new order are instructed to take no chances in protecting their lives and the United States mail, capturing bandits will be more profitable. An additional order of the postmaster-general provides a reward of \$5,000 to any post office employee, civil officer or citizen who delivers a mail robber into custody. GOLDEN WEDDING

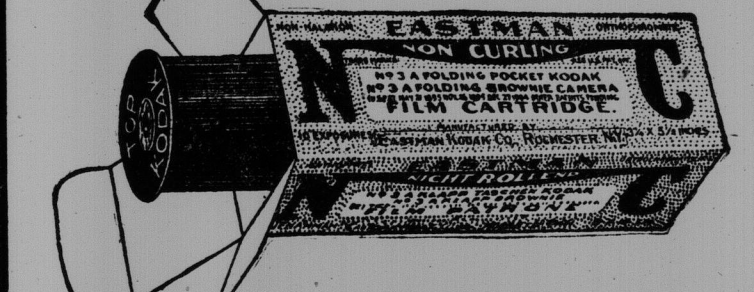
Mr. and Mrs. R. R. Patchell Remembered on the Fiftieth Anniversary of Marriage.

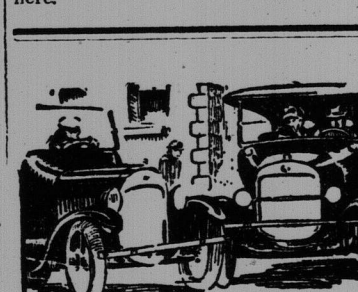
EDDY STRIKE ENDS

Ottawa, May 17.—The strike of the paper makers at the E. B. Eddy mills, Hull, Quebec, which started two weeks ago and which has resulted in nearly 400 employees of the company being kept out of work, came to an end this afternoon. The paper makers, will return to work under the same conditions and with the same rates of pay which prevailed prior to May 1, on the understanding that if a reduction in wages is decided upon by the majority of the big mills the reduction will go into effect in the local mills.

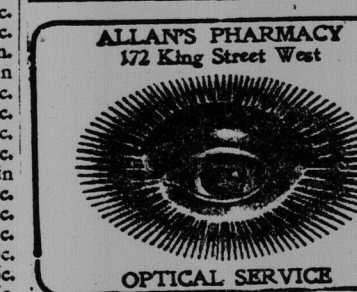
