### RAISE A STATE LOAN AS INCOME FOR PALESTINE

London, Sept. 16. - Plans are being formulated for raising a state loan for the purpose of generating an authoritative source here. The purchase is to guarantee an income for Palestine and the entire amount is first to be sorted by Jewish bankers here and in New York who in turn will offer it for public subscription.

### MISREP POWER.

The mayor and commissioners made an inspection of the old pulp mill and the Misrep dam yesterday with a view to considering the matter of harnessing the power for the purpose of generating electricity to light the city streets. It is said that about 800 H. P. can be generated but whether this could be transmitted to the city at a rate that would justify the expenditure of \$150,000 is a matter for careful consideration. It is said the local government has had an engineer taking readings of the flowage of the stream for the last two years and it is expected a report will be filed during the coming fall. When this information is at hand it is a possibility that the Misrep stream may be developed, but the matter will be carefully considered by the common council.

### EXMOUTH STREET WINS.

The Women's Missionary Society of Exmouth street Methodist church held a meeting yesterday afternoon with the president, Mrs. G. F. Dawson, in the chair. The subject was "Personal Service" and an interesting programme was carried out. Miss Rose Hopkins, who for the last few years has been doing domestic work in Halifax and Toronto, was present at the meeting and will be in St. John during the winter. Plans for the winter work were discussed at the meeting. Mrs. Lawson, superintendent of Christian stewardship, read a paper. A vote of thanks was extended to Mesdames Alex and Charles Magee for their hospitality at the August meeting.

### Ruth Denied Injunction.

New York, Sept. 16. - (By Canadian Press) - Supreme Court Justice Guy yesterday denied the application of George H. Ruth, better known as "Babe" Ruth, star of the New York American baseball team, for a permanent injunction restraining the Educational Film Corporation and others from displaying the moving picture entitled "Babe Ruth, How He Makes His Home Run." Justice Guy cites a decision in the case of Mrs. Grace Humiston versus the University Film Mfg. Company, in which that body ruled that the use of a person's picture as a matter of current news should not be restrained. Justice Guy does not prejudice the bill for \$1,000,000 which has brought against the film company.

### English Season Ends.

London, Sept. 16. - (By Canadian Associated Press) - A brilliant cricket season came to a close yesterday with Middlesex, the champion county, against the rest of England at Kennington oval. The rain spoiled the closing event which ended for four wickets and the Rest of England declared at 608 for five. Hobbs, for the Rest of England, scored 215. Hendren, for Middlesex, heads the batting averages for all first class matches with 61.66 per cent per innings. Hobbs comes second with 58.89. Rhodes, of Yorkshire, has the best bowling average of 161 wickets, for 18.16 per wicket.

## GROCERY REPORT FROM THREE CITIES OF THE DOMINION

The following comment on the market situation as regards food stuffs appeared in Canadian Grocer last week.

All grocery markets are generally steady although slight declines and also some advances have taken place during the past week on some lines of commodities. Fall trade has started favorably and merchants and manufacturers are looking for an active business this coming winter.

Montreal. - The sugar market here is inclined to be panicky and reports and rumors circulating are not tending to keep prices on an even keel. Molasses market is not so seriously disturbed and the spice market is quiet. Raisins are sure to be higher. French sardines have advanced. Wrapping paper has shown another advance.

Oranges are higher and apples much lower. General fruit prices are lower. There is a splendid vegetable market. Package oats will be lower in price. Rolled oats are short. The fresh meat market is very strong. Cheese is coming in in better supply.

Toronto. - The markets for general groceries are generally steady to firm with a few advances and some declines. There are no new developments in the sugar situation, the movements from refineries remains quiet but second hand sugars are moving at a variety of prices which are below that quoted by refineries. Retailers are selling sugar at prices ranging from twenty to twenty-one cents per pound which is also below market quotations. Those who have sugar to sell are all anxious to do business and are offering their stocks at prices below those at which it can be replaced from the refineries. The raw sugar market continues easy with very few sales being made. One brand of pancake flour advanced during the week also ice cream salt, carbonate of soda and one brand of salad dressing. One brand of corn flakes has again reduced quotations.

The cereal market is generally steady although roll oats show a decline. There is apparently considerable competition in canned goods, due no doubt to the lack of interest on the part of the retail trade to stock heavily, the result is that the price basis has been lowered. Greeting turnouts are falling in a very strong market; this condition has been brought about by the fact that the United States who previously to prohibition were a buyer of little importance, are now bidding against England for the available stocks in Greece and also for the new crop. The Greek current crop is estimated to be around 110,000 tons which is much below an average crop. There is very little change in the spice market pending the arrival of new crop goods; white peppers and cloves have shown a slight shading but otherwise the entire line is in a fairly steady position. The only change in the nut market is a slight decline in Spanish almonds, this decline is more a matter of exchange than market condition. Ceylon and Indian teas are firm with the better grades slightly firmer. Japan seconds which opened at fairly high prices are much easier and lower prices are expected. The coffee market is easier for futures, spot checks are unchanged. Vegetables are plentiful and low prices prevail. Since the decline of last week the flour market has shown a firmness.

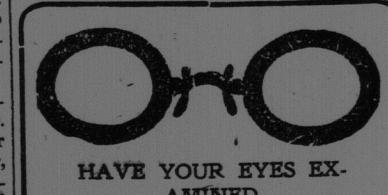
