CHICAGO PLANS TO HAVE LARGEST HOTEL IN WORLD.

Chicago, May 12—Plans for the largest hotel in the world were made public today. The hotel will be in five units, with the present Edgewater Beach Hotel as one unit, and will front three city blocks on Lake Michigan and Sheridan Road. The architects have planned 4,000 rooms. The cost is estimated at \$15,000,000. A theatre seating 2,500, 400 kitchenettes for those who desire to cook their own meals and one sixteen-story unit for bachelors are features. A minimum charge of \$15 a day in one of the units is contemplated.

AGREE NOT TO USE SUGAR UNTIL ITS PRICE DECLINES.

East Palestine, O., May 12—Five hundred employees of a tire and rubber company here have signed an agreement not to use sugar in their coffee or tea until the prevailing high price of the sweetening commodity declines. The agreement is said to be the first of a number in an attack against the high cost of living.

INDIANS SMOKE PEACE PIPE WITH HUDSON'S BAY HEAD

Picturesque Ceremony at Lower Fort Garry During 250th Anniversary of Old Fur Company.

Winnipeg, May 12—The ceremonies at Lower Fort Garry which renewed in the smoke of the peace pipe the ancient pledges of friendship between the Indian tribes of Canada and the Hudson's Bay Company were perhaps the most quaintly interesting feature of the celebration of the old fur company's 250th anniversary. Indians of a dozen tribes gorgeous in paint, feathers and beaded buckskin, squatted upon the grass within the stone walls of the old fort about the table of the old fur company's 250th anniversary. Sir Robert Kindersley, governor of the Hudson's Bay Company, Kinewakan, chief of the Wapeton Sioux, stepped forward. With fine dignity, the magnificent old savage delivered an address of welcome in his native tongue. From his beaded tobacco pouch the old chief filled a great calumet of red sandstone four feet long upon whose stem of white wood were painted the totems of all the tribes. He held the pipe aloft toward the sun and called upon the Great Spirit to witness the sacredness of the rite he was performing. 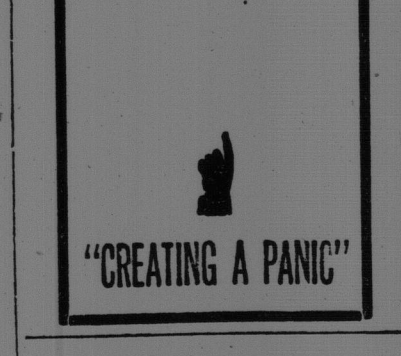

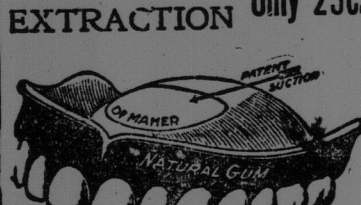
SEQUEL TO POKER GAME.
