

ELECTION BEFORE END OF YEAR IS POSSIBLE

Ottawa, May 8—There will be a general election before Christmas if the opposition stick to their avowed intention of obstruction after the adjournment is ended.

The census figures will be ready by October. The government can win easily on reciprocity. Expansion of the I. C. R., building of the Hudson Bay Railway, C. N. R. bond guaranteed for extension, Georgian Bay canal, enlargement of Welland Canal will also enter into the contest.

There will likely be a declaration that the government feels a start should at once be made with both the Georgian Bay canal and the enlargement of the Welland canal. Finally the country is likely to be asked to declare for or against a reasonable closure being adopted in the house of commons so that no opposition will hereafter be able to carry obstruction to such an unreasonable degree that the minority has the appearance of running parliament.

CONFEDERATE SOLDIER FARMER OF 1865

IERE is a figure with which history has dealt lightly, but that, standing pathetic and heroic in the genesis of our new growth, has interested me greatly—our soldier farmer of 1865. What chance had he for the future as he wandered amid me empty parns, his stock, labor and implements gone—gathered up the fragments of his wreck—urging kindly his borrowed mule—paying 60 per cent for all that he bought, and buying all on credit—his crop mortgaged before it was planted—his children in want, his neighborhood in chaos—working under new conditions and retrieving every error by a cost-by year—plodding all day down the furrow, hopeless and adrift, save when at night he went back to his broken home, where his wife, cheerful even then, renewed his courage, while she ministered to him in loving fenderness. Who would have thought as during those lonely and terrible days he walked behind the plough, locking the sunshine in the glory of his harvest and spreading the showers in the verdure of his field—no friend near, save nature that smiled at his earnest touch, and God that sent him the message of good cheer through the passing breeze and the whispering leaves—that he would in 20 years, have carried these burdens, uncomplaining make a crop of \$800,000,000. 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
