DEATH OF MRS. A. L. TEDFORD

E. A. Trilles conducting the service.

Mr. Tedford informs The Observer that in view of the raging epidemic in St. John he deemed it best to send his wife and little ones to her old home, for greater safety, and to leave him free to assist in caring for the sick among his flock. She seemed in perfect health on arrival here, but in a few days became slightly indisposed. She assisted in caring for other members of the household but on Thursday her condition became such that a physician was called. From then on until her death her condition was known to be grave. The husband arrived from St. John on Saturday and was with her until she passed away on Sunday. He and the surviving relatives have the sympathy of all.

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THE ARMISTICE TERMS HANDED TO AUSTRIANS BY GEN. DIAZ

Kaiser Reported Persisting in Refusal to Abdicate—Further Gains in West by French and British

Rome, Nov. 2.—The Allied terms to Austria have been handed by General Diaz, the Italian commander-in-chief, to Austrian officers who entered the lines bearing a white flag.

Paris, Nov. 2.—Emperor William is persisting in his refusal to abdicate, according to advices received here. He took refuge at German grand headquarters immediately after the meeting of the war cabinet at which the question of his abdication was raised, says a despatch to Le Journal from Zurich.

The French attack to the east of the Aisne, in the Vouziers area, was renewed this morning. Prisoners to the number of 1,400 have been taken.

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London, Nov. 2.—The village of Presea, southeast of Valenciennes, was captured by the British today. The British army is now in a general way in possession of the village.

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TWO MILLIONS AND HALF FOR THE FIRST WEEK

Victory Loan Here Swelled Today by \$50,000 From T. McAvity & Sons, Limited

When midnight marks the close of the first week of the Victory Loan campaign the local committee believes it will see them half way towards their objective. Subscriptions now in hand and those in sight promise a total of \$2,500,000 before the day is over.

This is a big achievement and the committee has a right to feel satisfied with their efforts and proud of the citizens who have made it possible. There is a long road ahead, however, and it will take work of the most strenuous kind to complete the drive. The committee today was gratified by receiving an application of \$50,000 from T. McAvity & Sons, Ltd., which helped to swell the day's total.

There are not a great many more big subscriptions in sight, and the committee does not expect much more than another \$300,000 in large sums. This leaves the great part of the balance to be secured in small and medium sized amounts, and that means the hardest kind of work for the committee and the most generous and self-sacrificing subscribing on the part of the citizens.

So far the lists show 3,200 subscribers, but it will be necessary for more than 12,000 persons, an average of at least one for every family in the city and county, to buy bonds if the objective is to be reached by the end of the first week.
