- Q. I show you a communication dated the 23rd November 1945, purporting to be signed by A. B. Simes, M.D., and addressed to Capt. L. W. Tracy at Dundurn. Do you recognize this document?
 A. I do. This document is also taken from the personal file

The letter is read and marked Erhibit "K", signed by the President and attached to the proceedings.
