SOLDIERS FLOCKING TO SIDE OF YOUNG TURKS

More Troops are Marching to Constantinople Determined to Overthrow New Regime--Death Roll Increased by Continuous Rioting.

Salonica, April 18.--Two battalions of soldiers are marching against Constantinople to-day determined to overthrow the new regime and place the young Turks into power again.

The first battalion took up the march last evening and the second started to-day. The remainder of the second army corps is preparing to depart and will probably march before nightfall.

It is reported that the third army corps will also join in the advance. The movement of the troops was inspired by the young Turks, who were driven here from Constantinople by the new regime.

Guarding Sultan's Palace. Constantinople, April 18.--News of the reported advance of the troops against this city to-day caused the Sultan to order the Anatolian guard to surround the palace.

Bodies of Two of Victims Found Tangled Up in Sail.

FIRE IN SAN FRANCISCO CLAIMS MANY VICTIMS

Number of Charred Bodies Have Been Recovered and it is Believed Others are Still Buried in Ruins.

San Francisco, April 18.--Six persons are known to be dead, nine are seriously injured, one of them fatally, and it is feared more dead bodies will be found in the ruins of the St. George tenement, at the corner of Eighth and Howard street here, which was destroyed by fire early to-day.

Fire Marshal Towne gave out the following statement: "The cause of the fire is unknown. It started on the second floor of the rooming house and was probably caused by a defective fuse."

Forty lodgers in the St. George had not been accounted for at noon. The following names are reported missing: M. Mack, P. King, J. Manfey, Peter Sexton, George Wilson, Jack May, P. Smith, B. Plumes Retard Rescue Work. San Francisco, Cal., April 18.--(Later.)--The wreckage of the nine buildings are still afire, although firemen have been playing water on them all day. For this reason the rescuing parties are retarded, the flames cutting off access to the portion of the burned area where the remaining dead bodies are supposed to be lying. There is little likelihood of any more bodies being taken out of the ruins for several days and it does not appear probable that anything like an accurate estimate of the number of dead could be made before to-morrow.
