THE FRENCH CENSUS.

THE FRENCH CENSUS. The first details of the recent French census shows some unexpected results. Generally speaking, the big towns have ceased to grow at the expense of the country, but the Mediterranean ports have gained enormously, to the prejudice of all the other seabord places. Bordeaux, Havre, Cherbourg and Dunkirk have been prosticular citationery while Nantes, Brest prisoner to bail.
