

YOUNG VICTORIAN DROWNED AT SEA

LOST WHILE SEALING IN NORTHERN WATERS

A Chapter of Accidents Reported by the Just Returned Schooner Ainoka—Bad Weather.

Before the return of the sealing fleet from Behring Sea every fall there is naturally a great deal of anxiety for the safety of those who man the little craft and whose adventures so often involve the greatest risk.

With the return of the schooner Ainoka on Monday, such a message has probably ere this been borne to the parents of Harry Anson, who was a member of the Annie E. Paint's crew. He was lost in Behring Sea through the capsizing of a boat early in the season.

The unfortunate young man who was drowned is a native of about eighteen years of age, his father being the proprietor of a second-hand store on Store street. He has spent a number of years at sea, and his experience on the water has been replete with adventures.

REVOLVER ACCIDENT. Fred. Rogers Shot in Arm With Bullet From 22 Calibre Weapon.

Fred Rogers, the 13-year-old son of C. W. Rogers, is suffering from a bullet wound in the left arm just above the wrist, as the result of an accident of which he was the victim on Saturday last. The unfortunate occurrence took place about 5 o'clock in the afternoon at the boy's home, Kingston street. It seems he had borrowed a 22 calibre revolver, and had put it into his pocket with the intention of returning it. In some way, not easily explained, the gun exploded, the bullet taking an outward course entering the left's arm.

HE GOT TEN MONTHS. Wood Convicted of Stealing From Patient in St. Joseph's Hospital.

On Wednesday W. J. Woods, the attendant at St. Joseph's hospital who was charged with stealing \$175 belonging to a patient, Mr. Chapman, was convicted and sentenced to ten months imprisonment with hard labor. The case has been before the court a week or so, a session having been held at the hospital last Tuesday, when the evidence of the informant was taken.

The Capital City, with 20 passengers aboard, had a big hole stove in her hull on the north side. She filled rapidly and barely had time to run for the beach, where she sank.

QUATSINO CAMP MAKING PROGRESS

PROVIDING MEANS FOR SHIPPING ORE

Tacoma Syndicate Have Discovered a Rich Body on the June Group of Claims.

A. G. Gwin, who returned on Monday from Quatsino, reports that rapid progress is being made at the camp. Works are now in progress which when completed will materially assist in making that one of the best mining camps in the province, and which will advance the interests of Vancouver Island in no small measure. The Yreka aerial tramway and the ore bins are being hurried forward, while the June group is making satisfactory progress upon their improvements.

The four thousand feet of aerial tramway from the Yreka property is being put in place by Mr. Riblet, of Nelson, who also put up the Yreka tram. This body of completely finished property, the direct to the loading bunkers at deep water. On the other side of the Sound the June group, held by B. W. Holcomb and F. G. Kellogg, of Tacoma, is making wonderful showing. HEAVY CASUALTIES ON BOTH SIDES

FURTHER FIGHTING IN SOUTH AMERICA

General Uribe-Uribe, Leader of Colombian Rebels, Forced to Surrender—Two Days' Engagement.

Panama, Oct. 28.—The revolutionary general, Uribe-Uribe, with ten cannon, 2,500 rifles and 300,000 rounds of ammunition, has surrendered to Gen. Marjeres at Rio Frio, near Santa Marta. The revolutionary force under Gen. Uribe-Uribe, which was defeated on October 14th, at Lacienea, retreated to Rio Frio and took up positions there. Gen. Marjeres with 2,000 men proceeded against the rebels from Lacienea, and engaged the enemy two days ago.

The news of this victory was received here by Gen. Perdomo and Governor Salazar this morning in a telegram from Gen. Marjeres. Details of the engagement are lacking, but heavy casualties on both sides are reported. The surrender of Uribe-Uribe is said to complete the pacification of the departments of Magdalena and Bolivar. The revolutionists now occupy the Isthmus only. In the fight of October 14th at Lacienea the revolutionary force consisted of 1,300 men.

Colon, Oct. 28.—The government Gen. Pinzon arrived this afternoon from Savanilla; he was especially sent from that port by the governor of the department of Bolivar to bring to the Isthmus news of the defeat of the revolutionists under Uribe-Uribe and Castillo at Rio Frio. Both these generals were made prisoners. There is much rejoicing in Colon and Panama over the success of Gen. Marjeres, and especially over the capture of Uribe-Uribe.

Washington, Oct. 28.—The latest Colombian note respecting the canal treaty, which arrived in Washington several days ago, has not yet been delivered to the state department, and there is some reason to fear that a serious hitch is threatened. This note was framed at Bogota on September 18th, a date coinciding with the arrival of Admiral Casey in Isthmian waters, and his checking of the passage of troops across the Isthmus by rail.

Since that date the admiral has had occasion to assert a police power over the Panama railroad and in the harbors at either end. There is reason to believe that these assertions of power, though in the view of state department here, they have the limits of the treaty between the United States and Colombia, by which the former guarantees freedom of traffic across the Isthmus, is viewed by Colombia with growing apprehension and suspicion.

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GRATIFYING CABLE TEST. The Anglia Expected to Reach Suva About the First of the Month.

J. Wilson, superintendent of C. P. R. telegraphs, returned from Bamfield Creek Monday evening. When he left, Engineer Dearlove, representing the Pacific cable board, had put in a week's test of the line and it was proving most satisfactory. He had not utilized the Dearlove automatic transmitter, the patent invention of the testing engineer, which is expected to make a record equal to one hundred letters a minute. By this the paper is fed into a mechanism which punches the letters. This is in turn fed into the transmitter and from sent forward. According to indications so far in the test the anticipated speed will be attained.

After bringing the water to the station side of the creek it is pumped to a steam pipe which is placed on an elevation about forty feet above the station.
