





The Voter, having marked his ballot, shall fold it so that the returning officer's initials may be seen without its being opened, and hand it to the returning officer, who, on examining the initials and number on the counterfoil, shall tear off the latter and deposit the ballot in the box. If a Voter accidentally spoil a ballot, he will be entitled to a fresh one on returning that spoiled

Should the voter not be able to read, or should he be otherwise incapacitated so as to need assistance in marking his ballot, such assistance will be rendered by the Returning Officer in the presence of the sworn agents of the respective candidates, and no others.

Returning Officers and their clerks are empowered to act as Justices of the Peace and peace officers for the maintenance of good order. Every voter is expected to obtain his ballot, mark and deposit it and leave the booth as expeditiously as possible.
