SITTING OF CIRCUIT **COURT HELD**

Grand Jury finds "No Bill" in on! criminal case before the Court.

The Madawaska County Circu't Court sat at Edmundston today with Chief Justice Barry presiding.

There was only one criminal case to come before it and no civil cases.

The Grand Jury found "No Bill" in the case of the King vs John Stadic, Stadig was charged with making upon a plate something apparently intended to resemble twenty dollar and ony dollar American Bank notes.
