Yesterday was the last of the most successful lobster fishing season which the Bay of Fundy fishermen have known in many years. Since the opening of the season on Jan. 15, the catch for the season has been largely in excess of any of recent years, both in the local trade branch, and in that which is devoted to export into the United States.
