

Preparing For Influx of Tourists

Quebec Province Making Ready for Many Visitors This Summer from Canada and the United States.

"Quebec Province is preparing for a big influx of tourists this summer, not only in connection with the Manufacturers' campaign seeing Canada first, but from the United States," said a business man from Montreal who was in the city Saturday.

"The railways and the lake and river steamship companies say enquiries already show that the inter-provincial and American travel will tax their resources."

Summer resort hotels on the St. Lawrence are being booked for bookings and even in Montreal the hotel men say the outlook is that their guests will have to sleep on the sidewalks.

"The Canada Steamship Lines are talking of utilizing their boats which lie at Montreal over night, as hotels, in order to cope with the anticipated rush of tourists."

"Montreal liquor dealers are laying in a vast stock of booze and if the St. Lawrence goes dry it will only be necessary to establish prohibition in Montreal and turn the booze supply into the gutters."

"Many Americans have abandoned the idea of going to Europe for the summer. In spite of the fact that American money goes a long way across the water, reports are that travelling is very difficult and hotel accommodation unobtainable unless booked months in advance."

"Many Montreal people who would like to go to Europe are deterred by conditions there, and will spend the summer on the Lower St. Lawrence."

"The Canada Steamship Company expect their river boats to do a great business. I suppose some overflow from the Quebec tourist traffic will come to the Maritime Provinces, though the attractions down east are not so well known as they might be."

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DR. JAMES POINTON DIED ON VOYAGE

Oldest Surgeon in the Cunard Fleet Died on S.S. St. George During Her Last Voyage to Halifax.

The voyage of the steamer Royal George which arrived in Halifax Thursday morning from Southampton direct, was very much saddened by the death on April 4, of ship's surgeon, Dr. James Pointon, the oldest surgeon in the Cunard fleet. Dr. Pointon had been ailing for some weeks, but in spite of the advice of his friends would not take to his bed and on Sunday while on his way to his cabin on a deck died, death being due to angina pectoris syncope. His death occurred at the age of his death, all of the ship's company attended.

Dr. Pointon has sailed in the Cunard fleet for over thirty years and is a well known and exceptionally popular figure on both sides of the Atlantic and many friends will mourn his passing. He crossed the Atlantic hundreds of times during his term of service and has been on all the big Cunard liners. He crossed on the Mauretania about eighty times and on the Lusitania more than that number, leaving that steamer two trips before her loss. He was also on the Aquitania and the Ordine for four years. He had been on the Royal George for two years.

New Fishing Schooner. The Nova Belle, another new Lunenburg county fishing schooner enroute to the fishing grounds for her first trip, sailed from Halifax Friday. The schooner was built in Mahone Bay by O. Hamm, and is 9 tons register, 128 feet long, 24 feet beam, and ten feet deep. She was launched on December 21st but was held in Mahone Bay all winter by the ice. The bay is now ridged in port Wednesday night. She is in command of Captain Wentzell.

Panama Canal. American shipping through the Panama Canal is according to a message received from Governor Harding of the Panama Canal Zone, by the National Weather Service Committee yesterday. He said that one-third more American ships than those of any other nation are passing through the canal and that for a long time the British held the preponderance by one-tenth.

RIVER CONDITIONS ON THE ST. LAWRENCE. River conditions Friday were described by Mr. H. A. Willard, agent of the Marine Department at Montreal, as follows: "Reports show that the ice is moving everywhere between Montreal and Quebec, slowly but surely. There is open water in many places but it must not be considered that the 'big shove' has taken place yet. There is an ice jam at Champlain, below Three Rivers, and the Lady Grey has gone there to open it. The water has gone down from ten to fifteen inches since Wednesday at Three Rivers. At Lake St. Lawrence, above the Lachine Canal, there are long stretches of open water and there is very little ice left between St. Anne's and Carleton. At St. John's great activity in connection with setting boats into commission and looking in preparation for the buoyage."

A GRASS FIRE. Saturday's and yesterday's bright sun and warm winds have had the desired effect and the green grass has begun to show in several places about the city. There was plenty of grass, however, that was not green and as a result men were engaged in pulling out a grass fire near some of the Douglas avenue residences yesterday morning.
