SINGLE TAX SCHEME

Moncton, N. B. March 27—Moncton had a referendum on the single tax scheme tonight when the mayor presided over a mass meeting of electors to confer a radical change in the assessment law.

The proposed legislation aims at single tax by a gradual decrease in the tax on buildings and improvements until at the end of four years such property will be taxed on a single basis.

The motion made by Mr. Hawke that the main section of the bill be eliminated and referred to a committee of the city council stands the city council.

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RECOMMEND INCREASE FOR FERRY EMPLOYEES

The ferry committee held its last meeting yesterday afternoon and made the report of the committee on the proposed increase of wages for the ferry employees.

The report of the superintendent was read and adopted. The requests for increase were as follows: For the two captains from \$75 to \$85; deck hands, firemen, oilers and gatekeepers from \$50 to \$60; the captains were granted a \$10 increase; the mates, \$15; the firemen, \$10; the oilers were given an increase of from \$50 to \$60 on a former petition. In his report, the superintendent, Mr. G. W. Baker, said that the cost of maintenance to date was \$12,682.24.

BIG SEIZURE OF LIQUOR AT ANNAPOLIS, N.S.

Twenty-two Casks of Alcohol Unearthed by Officials, as Well as Three Barrels of Other Stuff.

Annapolis, N. S. March 29—Thirteen casks of alcohol were unearthed today, a short distance from town and seized under the inland revenue act. This makes twenty-two casks of alcohol and three barrels of liquor seized this week, valued at more than \$6,000.

From information received from Scott Act Inspector McDonald, of this town, a large quantity of alcohol, was seized by Customs Officer Burnham, under the inland revenue act, consisting of nine barrels valued at about \$3,000. It was brought to town and stored in the customs building awaiting orders from the inland revenue department.

Shortly after another seizure of three barrels of liquor valued at about \$4,000, was made at the railway station, consisting of Montreal to the order of L. E. Wilton, C. P. R. Baker, by Scott Inspector McDonald, of this town, and taken to the county jail for safekeeping, until otherwise disposed of. Policeman McDonald is proving himself a very efficient Scott act inspector.
