A Mother's Cruelty. The investigation of the circumstances attending the recent death in New York of Carrie Janisch, at the hands of her mother, who is accused of roasting her child to death, has elicited testimony showing a cruelty on the part of the mother almost beyond belief. A woman who occupied a room on the same floor with Mrs. Janisch told the jury of inquiry that she heard Mrs. Janisch's little boy crying, "Mother, take the baby off the stove." The witness went in to the door, but was afraid to go in, the woman looked so wild. A physician said that he had visited the child in September last, for scalds, when the mother stated it had fallen in a pan of hot water. He had no suspicion of anything wrong then, but when he was called in again last Saturday, the father said to him that the mother had burned the child. The child was burned on this last occasion from the soles of its feet to its hips, and was completely denuded of skin, while lighter up the body furnished undeniable evidence of having been roasted.
